**Ask Stockholm Man to Accept Local Pastorate**

The Scandinavian Evangelical church, located at 886 Elm street, Winnetka, has extended a call to Rev. Ernest A. Rohrbach, of Stockholm, Sweden, as pastor. Rev. Rohrbach has not formally accepted the call, which came to him just prior to leaving for his home in Stockholm a few days ago, but the Winnetka congregation is hopeful that he may do so; in the near future.

Rev. Rohrbach's parents reside in Wilmette. He has been in this country for several months, on leave of absence from his charge in Stockholm and during this time has filled many appointments, both in the ministry and as lecturer. He is a forceful speaker and has gained wide reputation and popularity in ministerial affairs, both here and abroad.

The Winnetka church has been without a regular pastor for some time. Rev. H. O. Olney, who, for the past two years has been preaching there will soon graduate from the Moody Bible institute and has accepted a call to the pastorate of the church at New Britton, Conn. He will preach his farewell sermon to the Winnetka congregation, Sunday, August 1.

**MAKE HEALTH RECORD**

**Illinois Has Smallest Number of Diphtheria Deaths Ever Recorded Last Year**

Mortality from diphtheria in Illinois last year, the lowest ever recorded, was heaviest in Massac, Perry, Pulaski and Kendall counties where the deaths from this cause per 100,000 population were 22, 21, 20 and 19 respectively compared with 5.8 for the state at large, according to a statement issued today by Dr. Isaac D. Rawlings, state health director. No other county suffered a rate of more than 12 per 100,000 while 41 counties with a combined population of nearly a million reported no death whatever from diphtheria.

Among cities of 10,000 or more people mortality from diphtheria last year was most severe in Berwyn where the death rate per 100,000 was 5.9. Next in order come Quincy, Bloomington and Cicero with rates of 13.3, 13.1 and 12.8. Thirteen cities in this group had no deaths from diphtheria last year. These included Cairo, Chicago Heights, Forest Park, Canton, Streator, Waukegan, Lincoln, Granite City, Centralia, Jacksonville, Belleville, Freeport and Herrin.

Of the municipalities with 30,000 or more population, the highest mortality from diphtheria last year was found in Quincy where the rate was 13.3. Then followed Bloomington with 13.1, Cicero with 12.8 and Moline with 11.7.

**Has Lowest Rate**

The lowest mortality from diphtheria in this group of municipalities was in Peoria where the rate was only 1.2. Next lowest in order stood Rockford with 1.3, Decatur with 2 flat and Joliet with 2.4. None of the others had a rate in excess of 5 except Chicago where it was 8.

"The magnitude of mortality from diphtheria is now a matter that is decided by popular vote among the parents of the state" declared Dr. Rawlings in discussing the subject. "Every child in every county can surely and easily be protected against this treacherous disease by three doses of toxin-antitoxin. The state distributes toxin-antitoxin without local cost. Parents who wish their children immunized have only to negotiate with a local doctor.

"A number of cities throughout the United States have practically banished diphtheria from their borders by the general use of toxin-antitoxin. Notable among these is Auburn, N. Y., a city of 37,000 where no death has been reported for over 2 years.

"The diphtheria season in Illinois is just ahead. October and November are the peak months. Immunizing injections now will protect the children then."

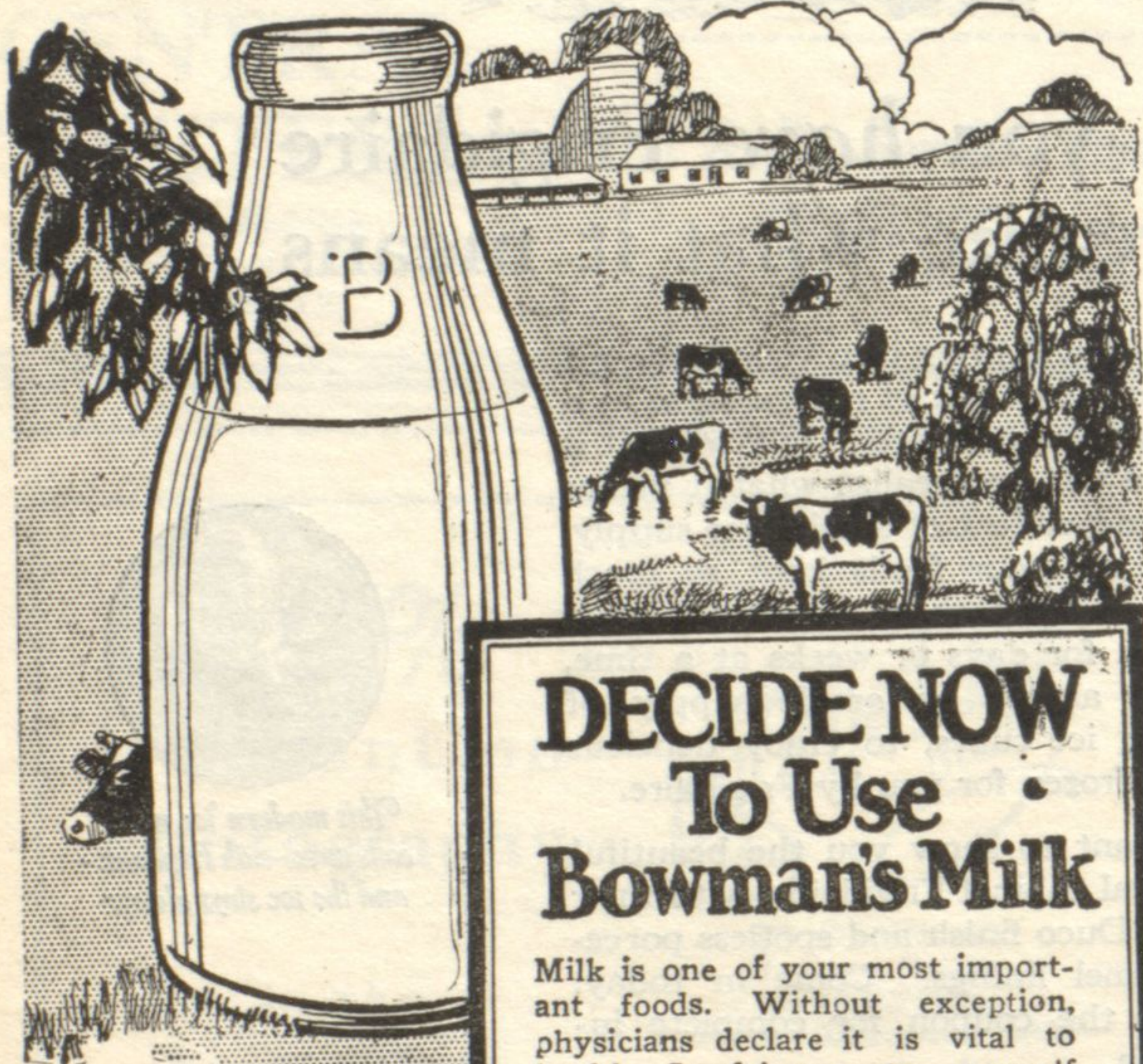
