## TAKE ACTION AGAINST PROPOSED BEACH CLUBS

### Wilmette Park Board Instructs Attorney to Draw Up Condemnation Resolution

A mass meeting of citizens of New Trier township, called for the purpose of considering proposed developments in "No Man's Land" will be held Monday evening, October 18, at the Kenilworth Assembly Hall.

George W. Hess, attorney for the Wilmette Park board, has been instructed to prepare a resolution to condemn park purposes for "No Man's Land," the triangle of county land lying between Wilmette and Kenilworth. This action was taken at the meeting of the Wilmette Park board last Monday evening, and was the result of requests by Village President Earl E. Orner, and Arthur Bonnet, representing Kenilworth citizens, that such action be taken.

According to Attorney Hess, the resolution is being drawn up and will be presented to the Park board at an adjourned meeting to be held next Tuesday evening, October 19, at the Wilmette Village hall. At this time there will be a discussion of the situation.

Residents of Wilmette and Kenilworth who live near the strip of county land, as well as many others, have been alarmed at the prospect of the erection of two club buildings to be known as the Vista del Lago and the Breakers. A moving picture theatre and a block of stores is now under construction.

#### Hold Mass Meetings

These residents feel that no building of the kind should be allowed there and

have begun a move to oppose them. There was a mass meeting at the Kenilworth Community house two weeks ago and last Sunday Wilmette and Kenilworth citizens met at the home of Arthur Bonnet, in Kenilworth, to discuss the situation. It was the request of these citizens which led the Park board to consider acquiring the land for park purposes.

It was felt that this was the only way to stop building on the land. It cannot be annexed either to Wilmette or to Kenilworth without the consent of the property owners, which, of course, is out of the question. It was found, however, that although the villages have no jurisdiction over the land, it comes within the limits of the Wilmette Park district, and the faction opposing the club buildings hopes to be able to prevent their construction by acquiring the land as a park.

Various values have been given the strip of land, one as low as \$500,000, but Village Attorney Charles H. Jackson of Wilmette said that the Gage family placed the value of their holdings there at \$7,000,000. According to real estate men, offers of \$1,000 a front foot for some of the land have been declined. The plan of the Park board is to raise the necessary funds to acquire the land by special assessment which would reach everyone in the Park district.
