How the nursing profession is meeting the ever increasing needs of the community will be explained by several distinguished speakers at a luncheon to be given next Thursday at the Casino club, 167 East Delaware place by a committee of Chicago women interested in advancing the profession of nursing.

Dean Goodrich is one of the most eminent nurses in the United States and has won wide recognition for her efforts to aid humanity through better nursing.

Williams, who, as president of the Board of Directors of the Illinois Training School for Nurses, conducted the negotiations for the recently announced merger of that school with the University of Chicago as a nucleus for the third University School of Nursing, will tell what may be expected from this notable contribution to the advancement of nursing education in the middle west.

The third speaker at the Casino luncheon, which is given under the auspices of a group of lay people interested in nursing known as the Central Council for Nursing Education, 116 South Michigan avenue, will be May Ayres Burgess, Ph. D. Dr. Burgess is directing a five year study of nursing education and schools of nursing under the auspices of the committee on grading schools of nursing, comprised of the national nursing organizations, the American Medical association, American Hospital association, National Public Health association, American College of Surgeons and several noted specialists in education including Prof. W. W. Charters of the University of Chicago.

Among the specially invited guests of council at the Casino luncheon will be Mrs. Harold L. Ickes and Mrs. B. F. Langworthy, of Winnetka.


