Muenzer Trio in Initial Concert of Chamber Series

The writer arrived at the Muenzer Trio recital in the middle of the first movement of the opening number, which happened to be Schubert's always delightful Trio in B Flat Major, Opus 99. It was being played with the technical ability and artistic feeling characteristic of this group of musician, Hans Muenzer, violinist and leader, Hans Koelbel, cellist, and Rudolph Wagner, pianist. The tones from the three instruments blended into a most harmonious and beautiful ensemble, holding the happy attention of the audience to the very close of the all too short program.

The second and last number was the Quartet in E Flat Major, Opus 87, by Dvorak. It was in marked contrast to the Schubert number. Where the latter was rather sweet and smoothly melodious, the Dvorak composition was alive with sprightly rhythms and near-Oriental phrases. The audience demanded and were given an encore, a classic selection, which sounded like Haydn. In this encore as in the second program number the viola part was played by Fred Rittner.

A capacity audience was present to enjoy this, the beginning of the 1926-27 season sponsored by the North Shore Music association. The next recital will take place on December 12, at 4 o'clock, in the Kenilworth Assembly hall.


