
At Skokie school the Armistice day program was under the direction of H. P. Clark, director of physical education, who was in France during the war. The service while brief was very impressive. The pupils came to attention at the sound of the bugle, saluted the flag and repeated the oath of allegiance. They remained at attention while taps was being sounded in honor of those who lost their lives during the war. Immediately following, Rev. Thomas A. Goodwin, of the Congregational church, described briefly the situation in the trenches when word of the signing of the armistice came to the men. Rev. Goodwin was an officer in the marines at the outbreak of hostilities and later was in the infantry in France.

Mr. Clark was also in charge of the Armistice day program at the Horace Mann school. There the children stood at attention for two minutes while the clock struck eleven. Mr. Clark explained that the armistice was signed at eleven o'clock and also told of how the event was received in France.
