People of Township Will See New Trier's First Play, "Captain Applejack," Tomorrow at Auditorium

And when these people go back to their respective homes, they will be happy, and in their eyes there will be reflected a bit of the gaiety and adventure that the play gave to them.

That is the sort of play that "Captain Applejack" is.

It is a thrilling action play that has been dipped in a bucket of humor and brought up dripping with laughter. And it is an ambitious play for a high school group to attempt to give, for the roles are difficult and call for no small spark of ability. There is hardiy a part that does not call for two distinct characterizations, and some call for three. And anyone who has had stage experience will agree that it is no easy task to step from one characterization to another within the course of an evening.

Now a word or two should be said about the people who carry most of the burden of the play on their shoulders.

The title role, that of Ambrose Applejohn, who for a time becomes the pirate, Captain Applejack, is played by Edward Bauman of Winnetka. He has had quite a bit of experience on the New Trier stage, for last year he acted in "The Admirable Crichton" and "Polly with a Past," and acquitted himself well in both. He is a senior at New Trier this year and is President of the Dramatic club there.

Marjorie Solomon, of Wilmette, who

plays the truly difficult part of Madame Valeska, has never before been in a full length play at New Trier. But it is safe to say that she will be hereafter, for in "Captain Applejack" she has worked hard to form her characterizations (she has three during the play), and as the leading woman she has succeeded in drawing a fine picture of Madame Valeska.

Margaret Ott and Stan Sherman, as the ingenue and villain respectively, do good pieces of acting and most surely will be fine support for the two

leading characters.

The last and certainly the most assuring thing that can be said about the play is that it is being directed by Miss Elizabeth Stanwood of the New Trier dramatic department. Surely that is a guarantee that "Captain Applejack" will be well done.
