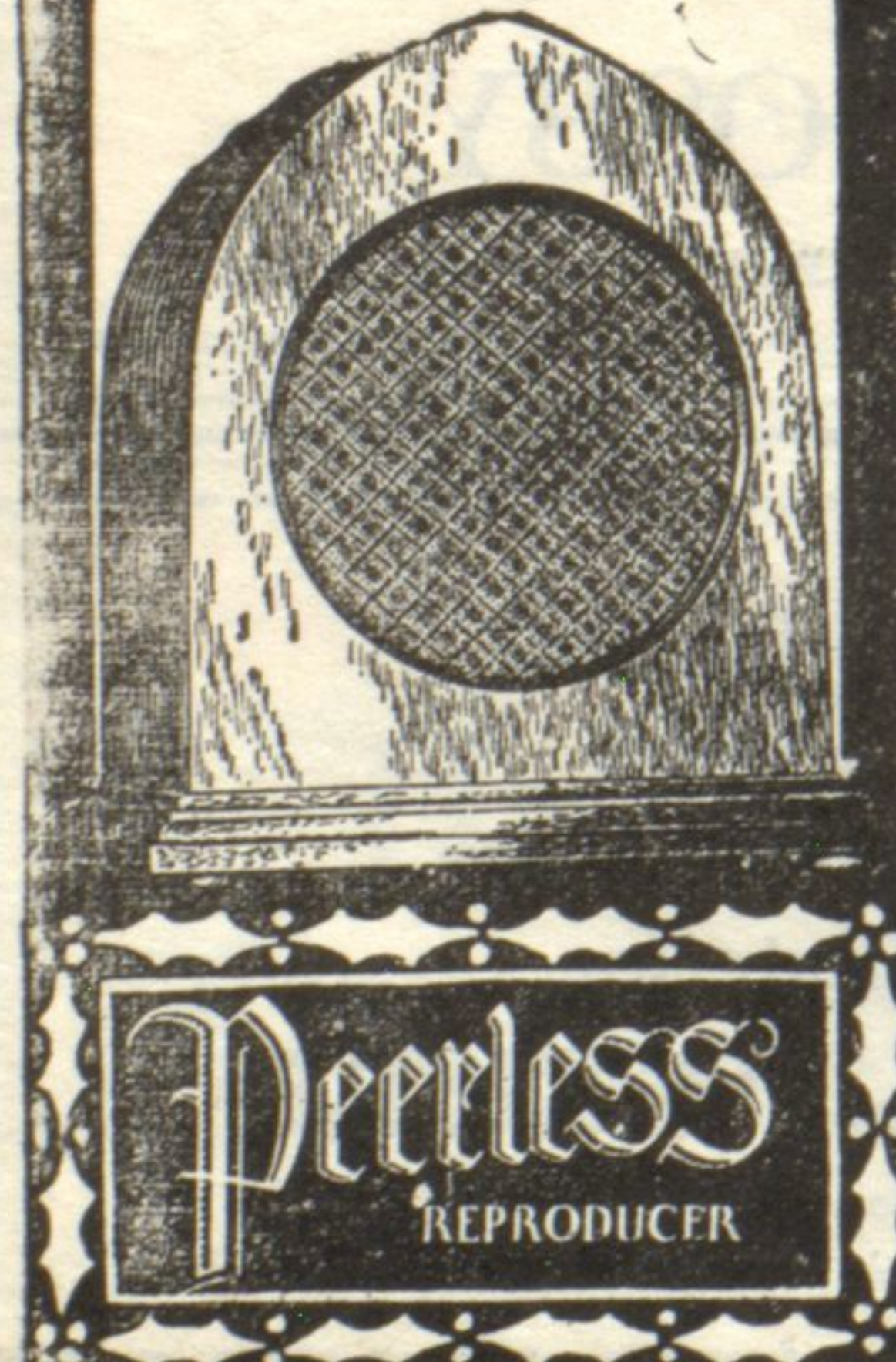

A list giving the names of children in seven Chicago mission schools and a gift which each child wants for Christmas, was posted in the hall, and an overflow list for an additional school was furnished to take care of students who were too late to secure a child on the original list.

Dolls were the favorite plaything by all odds, over one hundred children having asked for "a little doll," "a mama doll" or simply "a doll." Next in order came the trucks, one kindergarten having run entirely to trucks and dolls, but not all the trucks were

chosen by little boys, or all the dolls by the girls. Autos and yellow taxis were nearly as popular as trucks, and trains appeared many times on the list.

From these general favorites the list ran the entire gamut of toy shop merchandise—monkeys, horses, dogs, fire engines, wagons, sleds, cradles, doll beds, ironing boards, pianos and picture books. One small boy asked for a picture book for himself and a doll for his little sister.

The toys were presented at the opening of the Christmas festival in Harrison hall yesterday afternoon, and will be distributed to the children in time for Christmas.

Mr. and Mrs. Allsebrooke, who have been in Wisconsin for the past year, will leave shortly after Christmas to make their home in Dayton, Ohio.

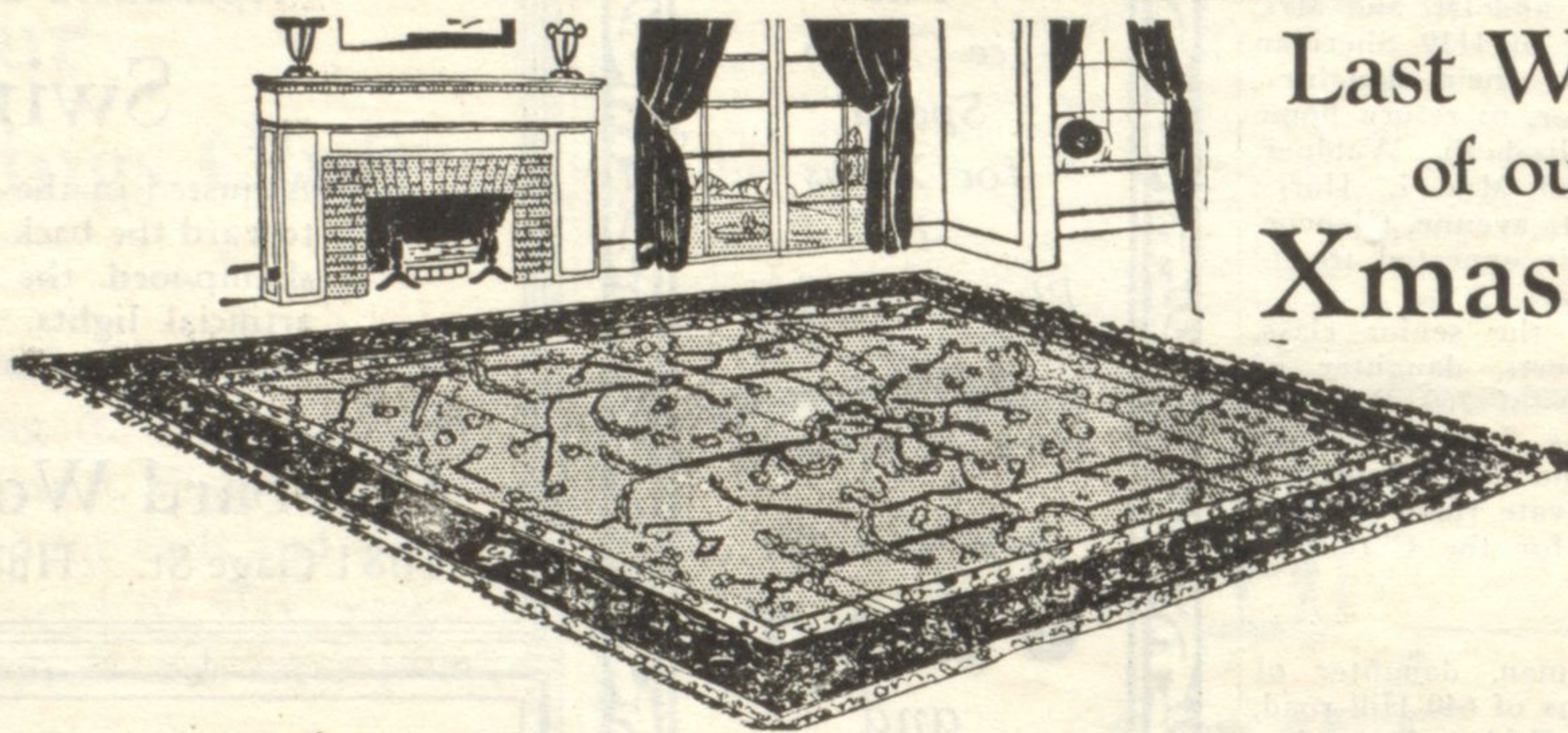
