It is real Christmas sharing to give this way, and we feel that your money has been spent in such a way as to bring real benefits as well as temporary pleasure to families most needing such help."

With the opening of the State Assembly in Springfield, the league believes that its field of work should be the education of its members concerning those bills which will be introduced at this session. A number of these bills have a special appeal to women, such as jury service for women, eight hour day for women, and the Woman's State Reformatory.
