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Catholic League Hears Reviews of New York Dramas

Members and friends of the North Shore Catholic Women's league who heard Mrs. Anthony French Merrill give her book talk Tuesday, January 4, at the home of Mrs. William Schneider of 911 Vernon avenue, Glen-coe, were saved a long and expensive trip to New York.

Mrs. Merrill dwelt especially upon the new plays she attended while in New York, and gave the group an opinion and criticism of them. Ethel Barrymore, who is starring in "The Constant Wife," and who always provokes opinions, either as to the choice of play but seldom the acting, received a great deal of attention from Mrs. Merrill. It seems that the play might be termed a bit strange in moral tenor. In fact, Mrs. Merrill felt that many of the present-day plays were rather 'wisted in their morals, portraying a complicated plot unraveled by the hero or heroine, with a twirk at the end, "spoiling it all."

She also referred to Eugene O'Neil's play which has been revived, "Beyond

the Horizon." The other play she stressed was "The Play's the Thing," in which this same strange moral note was found. The deception of the finest character in the play, the attitude that such deception was warranted because the beautiful heroine was thus saved, Mrs. Merrill felt, was typical of many recent plays.

The book of the year, Mrs. Merrill feels, is Willa Cather's novel "My Mortal Enemy," and she holds to the opinion that the woman's mortal enemy was herself, rather than the man, as many believe. Dr. Richard Cabot's new book on philosophy was also included in the discussion of new books. Dr. Cabot is of course famous for his "What Men Live By," and his latest book is welcomed by his admirers.

Those interested in keeping up with the times in literature, current events, and trends of philosophy, are cordially invited to attend these lectures, a nominal charge being made. Announcement concerning the next talk will be made later in the month.

The members of the League of Women Voters will sponsor such bills as "Eight Hour Day for Women," "Motor Drivers License Bill," "Child Labor Propositions," "Women on Jury," "Tenure of Office for Teachers," "A Larger State Distributive Fund," "A State Reformatory for Women," etc. Every voter interested in the progress of Illinois, and in helping to make this commonwealth, (the second wealthiest state in the union), one of which we may justly be proud, will be studying these measures in order to write to our senators and assemblymen our personal desires regarding the passage of these measures. The Illinois League of Women Voters is supporting the proposed Motor Vehicle code which is to be introduced into the coming session of the State Legislature. This code was drafted by the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws and approved by the American Bar association.

Article III of the proposed code requires the examination and licensing of all automobile drivers. This examination would be based on the simplest common sense safety requirements which would determine the physical and mental qualifications of the driver.

Thirteen states have adopted a law requiring the examination and licensing of all drivers. Is it not time that Illinois adopted some safety measure of this kind?
