North Shore Men Injured in Car Crash Near Elgin

Albert L. Seaman, 808 Greenleaf avenue, Wilmette, and David F. Noble, 240 Forest avenue, Winnetka, sustained serious injuries as a result of an automobile accident which occurred on state highway number 22, opposite Yeoman City of Childhood, near Elgin, at about 6 o'clock, Tuesday evening, December 28.

Noble, accompanied by Seaman, was driving north on the highway when his car was struck by a southbound machine driven by Chester Chapin of Highland Park. The force of the impact threw the Noble car into the ditch where it was overturned, while Chapin's car "ratcheted" off and collided with a third machine belonging to Elmer H. Lang of Carpentersville, Ill. In the second collision both cars were ditched and over-turned.

Seaman was the most seriously injured, having been confined to his bed since the accident with a badly wrenched back. Noble received cuts about the face and head; Lang was only slightly bruised; while Chapin escaped uninjured.

All three cars were badly damaged in the accident and Chapin was arrested on a charge of driving a car while intoxicated. At a preliminary hearing he was released on \$2,000 bonds and his trial set for some time in February. Chapin, it is charged, was so intoxicated that after the accident when questioned as to his destination, replied that he was going from Elgin to Highland Park. He was, however, headed back toward Elgin.
