

Women Voters Meet

Members of the Kenilworth, Lake Forest, and Winnetka Leagues of Women Voters met at Community house Monday, January 10, from 10:45 to 3 o'clock, for a legislative forum held in the Rudolph Matz hall.

Mrs. John N. VanderVries, president of the Winnetka league, turned the meeting over to Mrs. Cresap for the morning session. Miss Edith Rockwood spoke first describing the bill a bill has to go through before it becomes a law. It is, certainly, a most complicated process that "turns public opinion into law."

In "Interviewing our Legislators" Mrs. Walter Benson, chairman of the finance committee of Winnetka league and state treasurer of the Illinois League of Women Voters, read of her experiences. It must have been trying, yet worth it all, for the humorous impressions she received in addition to the sound opinions of the men. Mr. Howard Castle, Republican representative from the seventh district, Martin Finneran, Democratic representative of the seventh district and Senator Arthur A. Huebsch were on the list for interviews.

One half hour was devoted to the subject of the eight hour day for women bill, and a profitable one. Miss Agnes Nestor presented this topic, giving valuable arguments the more forceful because she had learned from experience as a "glover" what the conditions are under which women in factories are employed. It is to safeguard the next generation that this bill is introduced—we earnestly hope for its success!

At 1 o'clock the forum program was resumed as Mrs. VanderVries introduced Mrs. Frank Hixon, vice president of the Lake Forest league and national treasurer, as presiding chairman for the afternoon.

As a pleasant and proper opening, Mrs. Hixon, herself, delivered the first talk and set forth in a most interesting manner the arguments for the Child Labor law, the percentage of children under fourteen years of age who are now gainfully employed in Illinois is 12 percent, which is high.

Mrs. Percy Eckart of the state board of the League of Women Voters and a member of the Kenilworth league presented the Motor Drivers' License bill. This is a long bill—the part

chiefly concerning us is article three pertaining to the licensing of drivers and chauffeurs through mental and physical tests.

Since 1919 efforts have been made to secure for Illinois a state reformatory for women. Miss Jessie Binford, chairman of the joint committee on care and training of women offenders, addressed the women of the forum on this matter pointing out the great need for such an institution.

Mr. Anthony Czarnecki, by his "rapid firing," as he called it, determined to illustrate how the election laws might be bettered. By doing away with the strictly "partisan" idea and allowing an "independent" to serve, if given opportunity, might help. That the "selection of clerks and judges of election should be based on intelligence instead of locality" was another argument. Mr. Czarnecki was very convincing in his manner and described in detail courses for poor elections.

Mrs. M. H. Lieber, state chairman of education for the Illinois league of Women Voters and legislative chairman for the Winnetka league spoke on "Backing our Children's Rights to an Education." The forum was adjourned at 3 o'clock.

Friendship Circle Plans Sleigh Ride Next Tuesday

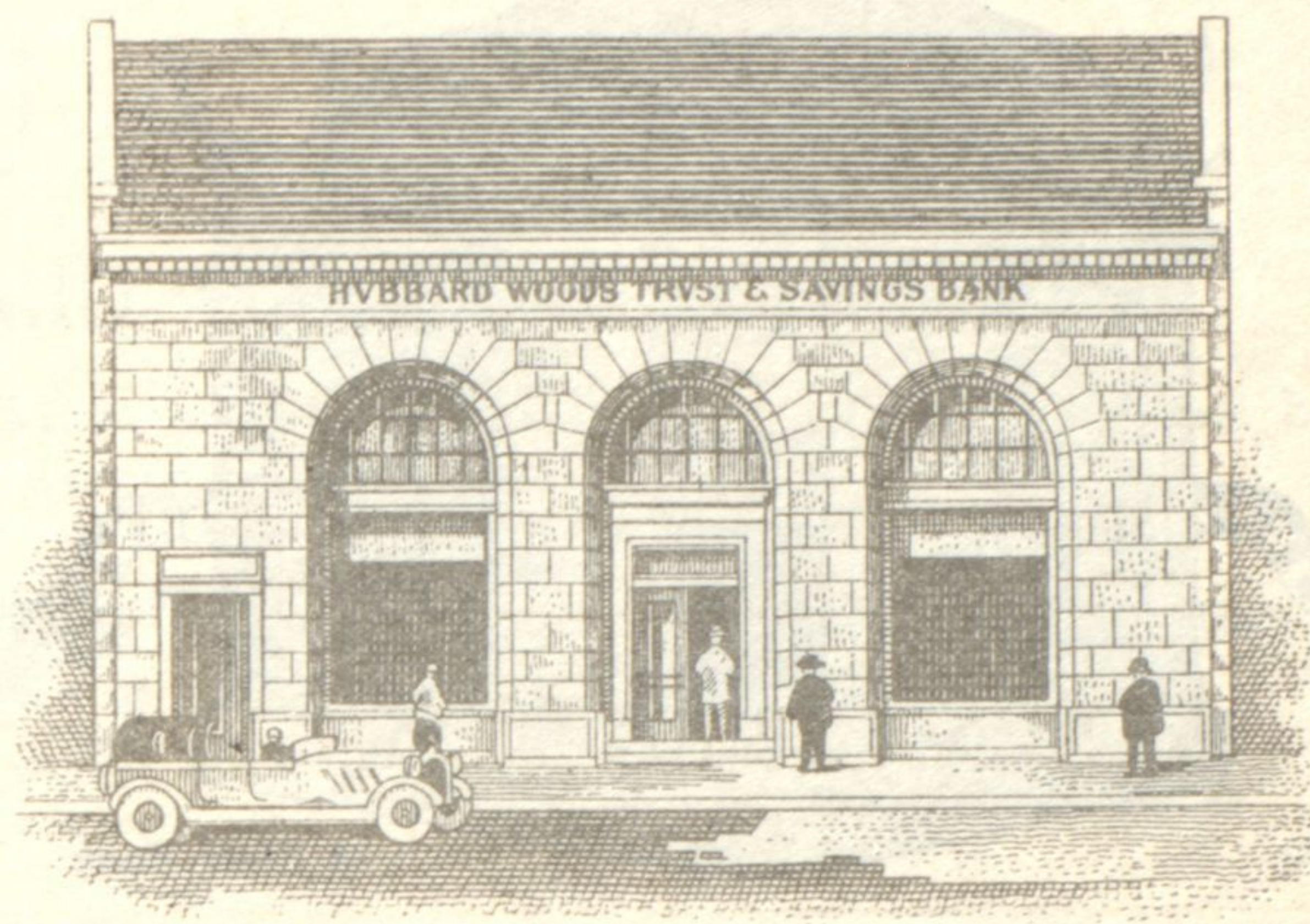
