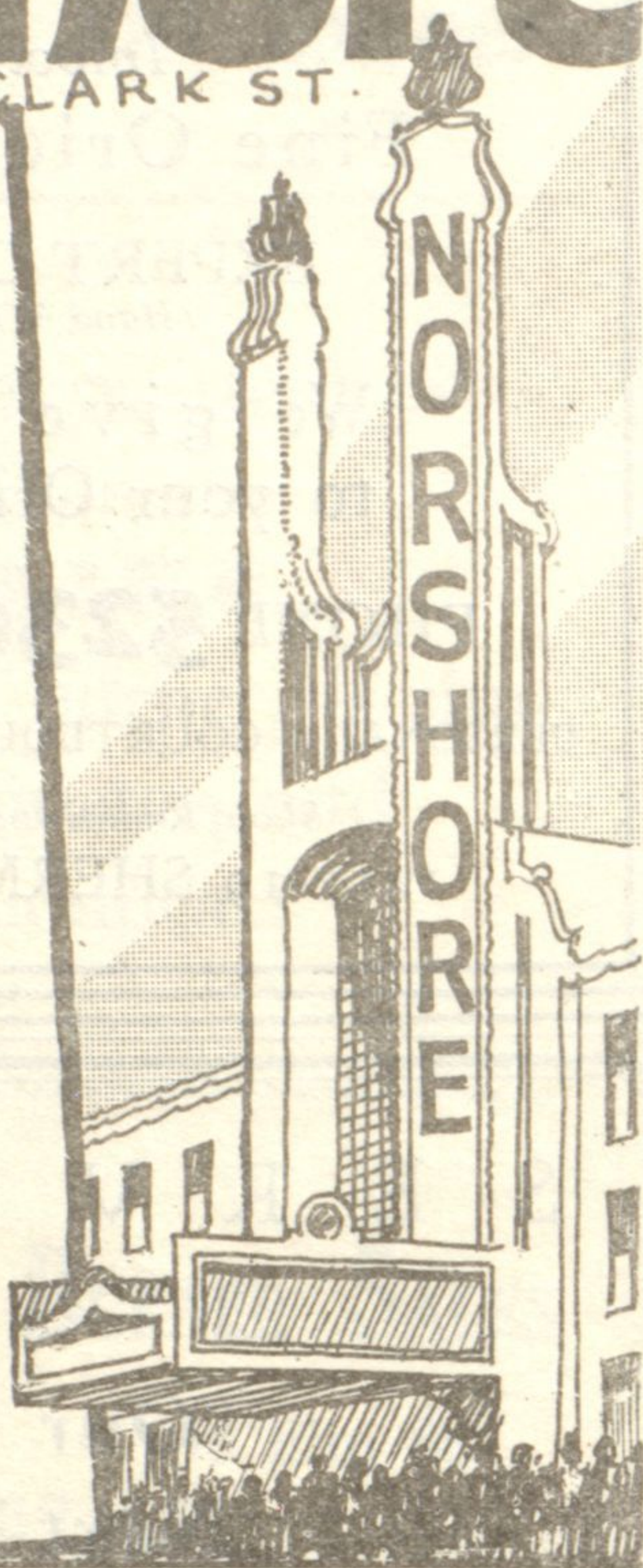

VILLAGE THEATER

Movie fans will be awaiting with inter-
est their first opportunity to see
First National's new star, Ken May-
