Rev. Thomas A. Goodwin also told an interesting story regarding the Wolsteds in India. They are managing through agricultural education, to bring the message of Christianity to the people there. Through the departure of the head of the leper colony, Mr. and Mrs. Wolsted now have charge of the colony and are tireless in their efforts to help those stricken people. Injection of a certain serum is curing and arresting the disease, which adds to the hope of the natives. Mr. Wolsted has taught methods of agriculture and held exhibits of his work.

During the dinner the Adult Chorus choir gave several numbers, including in their first group, "A Sailor's Wife a Sailor's Star Shall Be," and "Oh Susannah." Shortly after this Mrs. Floy Little Bartlett and Mrs. Valona Brewer of the Columbia School of Music, played a violin duet, "Balero," a Spanish Dance, written by Mrs. Bartlett, accompanied by Mrs. Arthur Dean.

The entertainment provided for the guests by the committee was simple and great fun, for groups of tables took part in the round, "Three Blind Mice," the speaker's table singing last. The choir then finished its part of the program by several rounds and old time songs.
