

North Shore Will Have Its Own Day at Hoosier Salon

North shore villages have been given a special day for the third annual exhibit by more than one hundred Indiana artists and sculptors, the "Hoosier Salon," which opens January 31 and continues until February 12, at the galleries of Marshall Field and company. The North Shore Day will be Friday, February 4. There will be a tour of the galleries at 11 a. m. conducted by Lucie Hartrath, who will talk about the Hoosier artists, who have become as famous as have Indiana authors. The hostesses for the day will be Mrs. William A. Kendrick and Mrs. E. H. Freeman of Wilmette, assisted by other north shore members of the Daughters of Indiana and patrons of the Hoosier Salon.

Among the paintings to be exhibited this year are several which were made in the sand dune country of northern Indiana. Most north shore residents are familiar with this beautiful spot.

Various colleges of Indiana are to have special days also. On the final day of the exhibit, February 12, alumni of Butler, Earlham and Franklin colleges are to have their opportunity for meeting old friends.

The Hoosier Salon is an outgrowth of a desire expressed three years ago by members of the Daughters of Indiana, which has many members in north shore towns, to display the work of the artists of their native state. The members of the Indiana society of Chicagd have ably assisted in this work.
