

This museum houses Dr. Breasted's treasures from Egypt and Mesopotamia, and the pupils were guided through the museum by two expert historians on the staff of the university. Some of the antiques that interested the class particularly were a diorite stone jar from 4,000 B. C.; a model of a pyramid with a tomb-temple, made to scale; a section of an original copy of the Book of the Dead and some very ancient knife coins.
