

Religious Plays to End Conference of Churches on Drama

The Chicago Council of Religious Education will conduct an all-day conference on "Dramatic Methods" January thirty-first. This conference offers workers in churches and Sunday schools an opportunity to become better acquainted with the dramatic method in religious education. The morning and afternoon sessions will be held in the ballroom of the La Salle hotel. The evening's program consists of a series of dramatic presentations, beginning at eight o'clock. The presentations are as follows:

In the First Baptist church, at 607 Lake street, Evanston, "Simon's Wife's Mother" will be played by the Mizpah class of the Wilmette Methodist church school, Miss Mabel Hawthorne directing. Mrs. Best is chairman of the religious drama committee of the Drama League of America. At the Chicago Training School, 4949 Indiana avenue, "The Age-Old Dream" will be given, Mrs. Grace Sloan Overton, M. A., directing. This beautiful presentation will be played by a selected group from the Chicago Training school.

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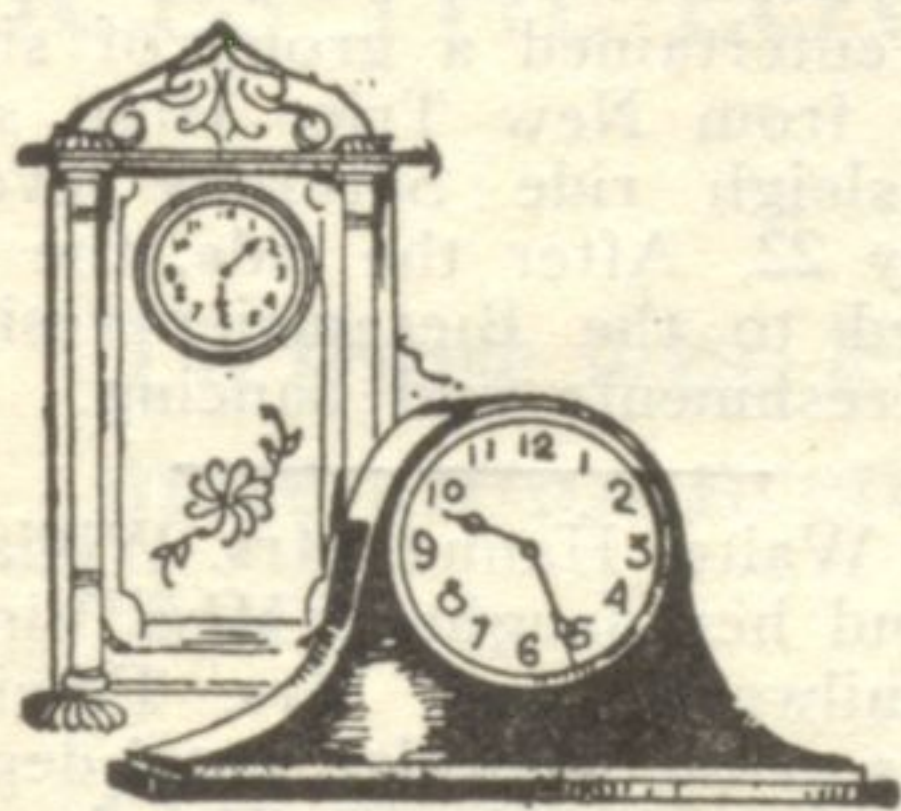
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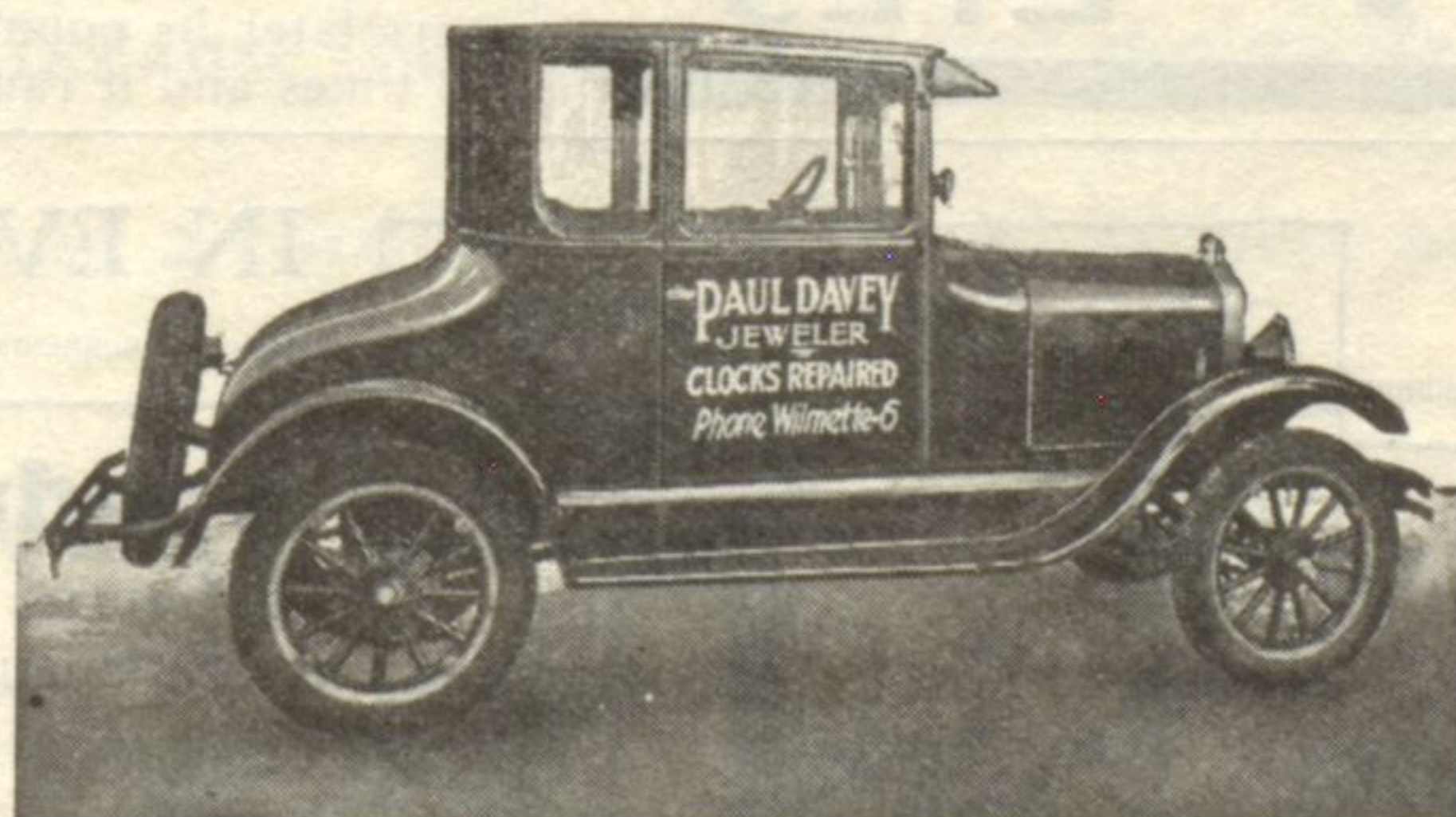


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
