

Arden Shore Holds Winter Camp for Underweight Boys

Arden Shore activities are not confined to summer camps alone, nor to fall and spring work, but continue through the winter months. This winter, a camp for fifty boys about 14 years of age is being conducted at the Lake Bluff Arden Shore site, and on behalf of these boys, who are underweight and convalescent, the Winnetka committee of the Arden Shore organization is making the following announcement.

The 50 boys seeking health at Lake Bluff, are striving for working certificates. They are either run down, undernourished, or convalescent, and without this certificate they cannot be dismissed from the camp. The program they follow is to sleep, work and play out-of-doors as much as possible, practically all day and night.
