

## LOCAL WOMEN SHARE IN GOVERNMENT INSTITUTE

### League of Women Voters to Cooperate With Northwestern in Discussions

A discussion of election laws in Illinois, including the direct primary which continues to be under the fire of many students of government, will take place on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday afternoons, March 2, 3 and 4, at Northwestern university under the auspices of the Institute of Government of which Mrs. May Wood-Simons is chairman. The discussion, while mainly for women voters of Illinois, is not to be limited to them and mere man is extended a cordial welcome. Many local women will have an active part in the Institute affairs.

Proposed changes in Illinois election laws will be discussed on Friday, March 4, by Judge Edmund J. Jarecki of the Cook County court. "What a Citizen Should Know of the Illinois Election Laws" will be the topic of Prof. Albert Russell Ellingwood of Northwestern university, on Thursday, March 3, and the direct primary will be the topic to be handled on Wednesday, March 2, by Dr. Jerome Kerwin of the University of Chicago.

World topics also will be leading matters of discussion and will have experts to direct the round tables. Among the more important international subjects to be discussed will be "International Relations" to be considered by various authorities, including Dr. Frank Whitmore of Northwestern university chemistry department and an expert along lines of "Chemistry in World Affairs"; Dr. Isaac J. Cox of Northwestern who will talk of "Inter-American Problems in the Foreign Policy of the United States," and a presentation of views upon "Raw Materials in World Politics," by Dr. Jacob Viner, of the University of Chicago.

Some purely American questions will come up under the head of "The Federal Constitution," with Prof. Kenneth W. Colegrove of Northwestern university leading the discussion each of the three mornings at 10 o'clock. Prof. William L. Bailey and Dr. A. J. Todd of Northwestern and Dr. S. P. Breckinridge of the University of Chicago will lead in the consideration of "Public Welfare in Government," also a forenoon topic, and at luncheon roundtables at the Georgian Hotel, Evanston, "Child Labor," "Home Rule in Illinois" and "Why Women Wish to Serve on Juries" will be food for reflection and debate.

Many of the better-known Illinois women who have become active in the movement to interest women in topics of the day in politics, have agreed to serve on the several committees. Mrs. Wood-Simons has the co-operation of the following as presiding chairmen at the various meetings:—

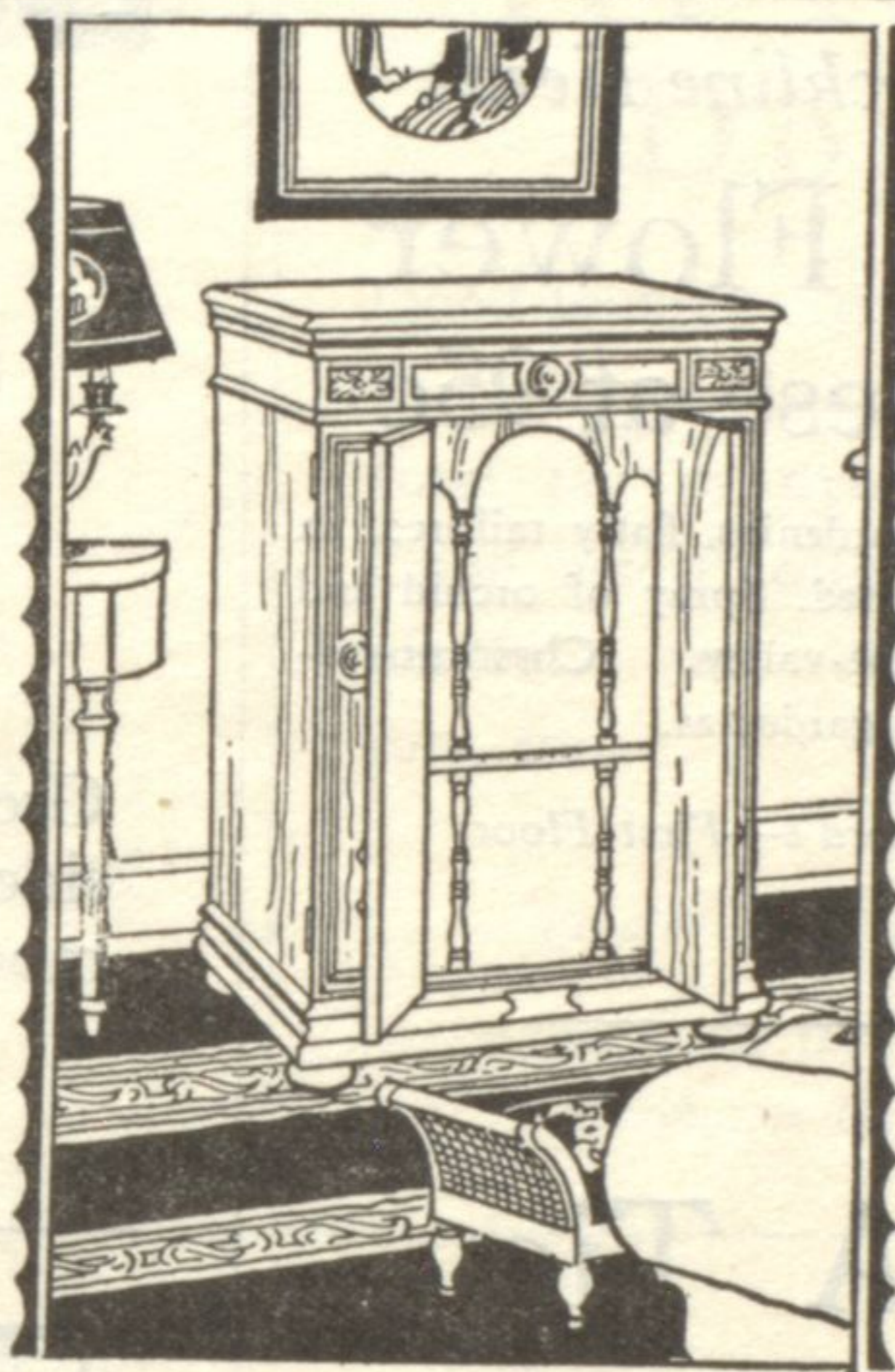
