## Deerfield Man Is Taken by Police on Hold-up Charge

Richard Dewitt Stanhope, said to have confessed to robbing the A. W. Dilling residence at 545 Essex road, Kenilworth, on February 9, and to have admitted seven other robberies in Evanston, Glencoe, Kenilworth and Chicago, was arrested by police of the South Clark street station, Chicago, early last Saturday morning while sleeping in a stolen car on a side street in the South Clark street district.

Officers effecting the arrest are said to have noticed a car standing on a side street and upon investigation discovered Stanhope asleep in the car. A search revealed that he was carrying a 45 calibre automatic pistol and that he had in his possession a large number of pawn tickets. He was taken to the South Clark street station for questioning where he is alleged to have confessed to several hold-ups.

At the time of his arrest Stanhope was wearing a watch and chain that was later identified as the one taken from Mr. Dilling on February 9. Investigation also revealed the fact that the car in which he was found was a stolen machine while the pawn tickets led to the recovery of a considerable amount of loot taken from his victims.

The alleged thief is a resident of Deerfield and is said to hold an unblemished record in his own community. He is being held by Chicago police pending action taken against him by the different municipalities in which he operated.

## READY TO ENROLL FOR ANNUAL C. M. T. CAMP

### Government Offers Splendid Vacation Proposition to Young Men of North Shore

Four thousand three hundred and fifty young men of Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin will be given an opportunity to enroll in the Citizens' Military Training camps during July and August this summer for such are the plans announced by Brigadier General Michael J. Lenihan, commanding the Sixth Corps Area.

Training camps affected by this announcement and the numbers of C. M. T. C. students to be enrolled at each are: Fort Sheridan, Ill., 1,600; Camp Custer, Mich., 750; Fort Brady, Mich., 250; Camp McCoy (Sparta), Wisconsin, 250; Jefferson Barracks, Mo., 1,600, of which 1,100 will come from the Sixth Corps Area; and Fort Snelling, Minn., 1,800, of which 350 will come from the Sixth Corps Area.

These camps are provided for under Section 47d of the National Defense Act of 1920 and have been growing each year. During the past six years there have been more than 165,000 enrollments, and so popular have the camps become that forty of them will be established by the government this season.

More and more is it becoming understood that military instruction is not the exclusive goal of the C. M. T. camps. Such fundamentals as order, neatness, punctuality, courtesy and a willing obedience to lawful authority are made the basis of camp routine, and as a consequence citizenship training is becoming an outstanding feature.

#### In Camp 30 Days

The camps at Jefferson Barracks, Mo., Camp Custer Mich., and Camp McCoy, Wis., open on July 7; the camps at Fort Sheridan and Fort Brady, Mich., open July 28. All of them are for thirty days. Days of training and recreation—for the policy of devoting practically all of the afternoon to various forms of athletics and recreation is now well established.

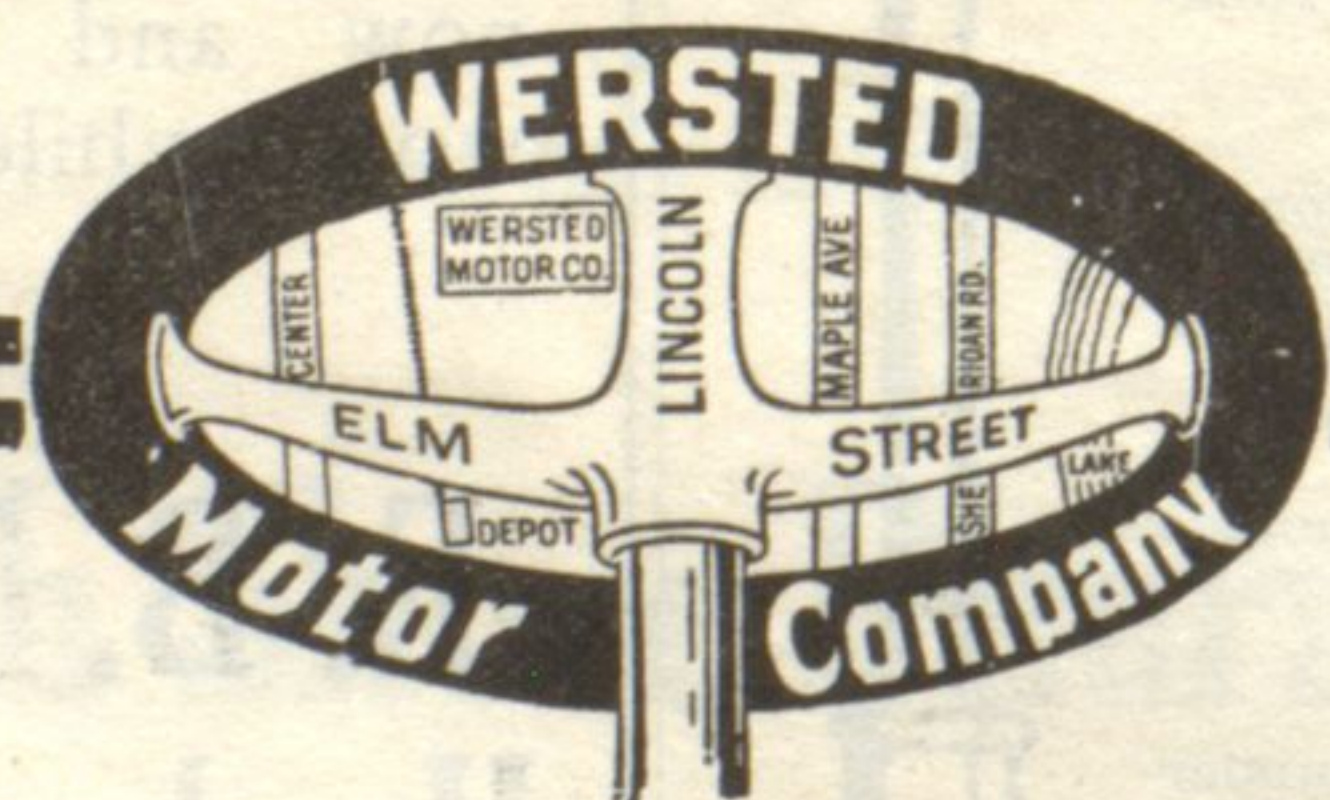
