

To Hold Benefit Sale for Church Building Fund

Preliminary plans for the raising of a building fund with which to erect a new Congregational church at Lincoln, Pine, and Prospect avenues, are in the making, and each week various committees will meet to record the progress made. An announcement was made by Mrs. Ayres Boal, chairman, that a huge white elephant sale would be held early in May.

Members of the Congregational church and all others in the village interested, are urged to send to Community House whatever they have—at once. The proceeds of this white elephant sale will be turned into the general fund for the new church.

Preparations have been made for receiving furniture, musical instruments, baby carriages, clothes, bric-a-brac, books, and a host of other things. Anyone may send things direct to Community House; others who have articles for the sale but no way of delivering them need only notify Community House and the items will be picked up. The committee in charge of the sale has arranged to supply a truck when necessary to bring furniture or extra large pieces. The plans for raising money are numerous and many. The response received from the members in this white elephant sale will be a test of the interest people in the village have in this new church project.
