**Reviews of
New Books**

"A WREATH OF CLOUD"—Lady Mura-
saki. Translated by Arthur Waley.

Again, by the publication of another
volume of the Japanese classic, "The
Tale of Genji," we are enabled to
follow further the adventures of this
charmed and charming man. This
volume for reasons which it is not easy
to determine seems more delightful
than the other two. Perhaps it is that
Genji grown to mature years and mel-
lowed by his experiences, more readily
wins our sympathy, perhaps that he
and his friends have by familiarity be-
come our friends, too, or perhaps sim-
ply that we are more able to keep them
and their intricate names and relation-
ships straight in our limited Western
minds.

He builds a palace, spacious and
charming, with delightful gardens, in
which his various concubines are hous-
ed in splendour and with strict eye to
equality. Genji has seen too well what
jealousy can do. Here they live for the
most part in peace and equanimity.

It is really a remarkable thing, this
novel written before the year 1020. It
is modern in its outlook, exceedingly
penetrating in its psychology; except
for some quaintness of speech and a
tendency to poetry which has never
been a characteristic of Anglo Saxon
races the characters might be living in
any place at any time. None but the
Japanese, however, would bewail the
loss of friend and father thus, "Spring
comes, and still the sweet birds warble
as of old, but altered and bereft are
they that sit beneath the blossoming
tree."
