Births Decrease in 1926 But Far Exceed Deaths

Births outnumbered deaths by 48,-827 in Illinois last year with 1,281 fewer births and 3,733 more deaths recorded than were reported in 1925, according to official statistics released by Dr. Isaac D. Rawlings, state health director. These figures show a net gain in population from this source of slightly more than one-half of one per cent and a rise of about one per square mile in density of population. The birth rate per 1,000 people is one of the lowest on record but the death rate, although higher than for 1925, is still well beneath the average for the decade ending with 1920.

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
