Mr. Eckstorm was architect for a number of the original buildings of the University of Chicago. He is survived by his wife and one daughter, and also a sister, Miss Caroline Eckstrom, of 888 Oak street, Winnetka. Funeral services were conducted Thursday from the residence, 717 Gordon terrace, by the Rev. James Austin Richards, pastor of the Winnetka Congregational church. Burial was at Graceland.
