

### WHOOPEE! THE CIRCUS

Wild Animals(?) 'n' Everything at Northwestern's Big Show to Be Under Canvas April 29 and 30

"Gypsy Rendez-vous," "Northwestern on High," and "The Ten Scribbler Brothers" are some of the specialty stunts which will occupy the center stage at Northwestern university's annual circus, under the auspices of the campus Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A., April 29 and 30. These are to be the contributions of Omega Upsilon, Chi Omega and the Scribblers, respectively.

Miss Edith Dillon and Gordon Barker announced Tuesday that the following sororities and fraternities with the stunts named are winners of the right to show their stunts before the circus audiences: Delta, Delta, Delta, "Darktown Circus"; Sigma Chi, "Northwestern's Greatest Sideshow"; and Tau Delta Phi, "The Evolution of Music." There will be novelty stunts by sororities, Sigma Alpha Iota, "The Bear-Backs"; Kappa Kappa Gamma, "The Campus Race"; Alpha Epsilon Phi, "The Animal's Fair"; Alpha Xi Delta, "The Circus Coquette; Aokiga, "Pink Lemonade or Circus Moonshine"; and Delta Mu, "The Circus Acrobats."

#### Side Ring Acts

Side ring acts by fraternities are "The Wah Show" by Sigma Alpha Epsilon; "A Fraternity Tumbles" by Phi Mu Delta; "Persecution of the Christians" by Phi Nu Beta; "Refreshing Incidents" by Delta Tau Delta; and "The Trained Phi Deltas" by Phi Delta Theta. One of the professional fraternities from the McKinlock campus of Northwestern will give the sixth fraternity novelty act. The contest on the downtown campus has not closed yet.

Fifty Northwestern organizations entered the contest in which the eighteen were chosen. The stunt field was narrowed down to 18 on the advice of the judges, Maury Kent, Northwestern's basketball coach, Mrs. Leon G. Kranz, wife of a professor of physical education, and Prof. Frederick B. Kaye, of the Department of English.

#### To Award Cups

Four cups will be awarded for the best novelty and specialty stunts. Special clown stunts and one or two specialty acts will be additional features of the performance.

A tin-type man will be on the

grounds, Miss Ruth Finn and George Stineback have announced. The field north of the gym will have the usual ferris-wheel and merry-go-round, and the sideshows will be open all day Friday and Saturday, April 29 and 30.

Performers from the all-university vaudeville will star in one side-show feature to be given several times during the day. Other side-shows will be a fish pond where fortunes may be tried at drawing prizes out of a grab-bag, a fortune-teller, a corn game which won its way by last year's popularity, a "nigger baby" to throw balls at, Abdullah, magician and mind-reader, (a student at Northwestern last year) ponies for the children to ride and at least two professional shows.
