National Kindergarten Students Get Some Timely Vacation Suggestions from Wilmette Minister

"So You're Going on a Vacation," given as the subject of an address, proved to be the starting point for a delightful trip through the possibilities of vacation-land for the students of the National Kindergarten and Elementary college last Tuesday, with Dr. Stephen A. Lloyd of the First Congregational church, Wilmette, as conductor of the tour.

One of the finest possibilities of vacation time lies in the fact that "it gives us a chance to see ourselves and to say some things to ourselves that in the busy, work-a-day life, we cannot say—"You are not the person I thought you were. You are not I. You have terrible prejudices and I loath your tricks. I wish you would be yourself!"

And then there is the opportunity to read the books we have always intended to read. "If you as teachers are going to help others to appreciate the best and not to take counsel of the worst, you must store your minds with the things that count," said Dr. Lloyd.

Vacation time must be counted on primarily to build up the tissues frayed in the daily wear and tear of life; slumber to atone for many lost hours, a tonic for our waning strength and courage, cheer—and the best cheer is the enjoyment and cultivation of friendships and companionships—do-

ing something for somebody else even in vacation time.

Dr. Lloyd suggested that vacation time, even in the despised dull home town, might not be such a deadly affair if one had something to bring to it. "The child cannot sit down and be quiet and be happy—he has nothing inside to interest him, and some of us never grow up enough to find that the real satisfactions of life are those which are within. We cannot change our environment and we cannot change this hard-hearted, hard-headed old world, but we can change ourselves, our outlook, our aspirations,

our affections, pretty nearly everything we have, and to bring true happiness and contentment to ourselves is to bring contentment and happiness to the world.

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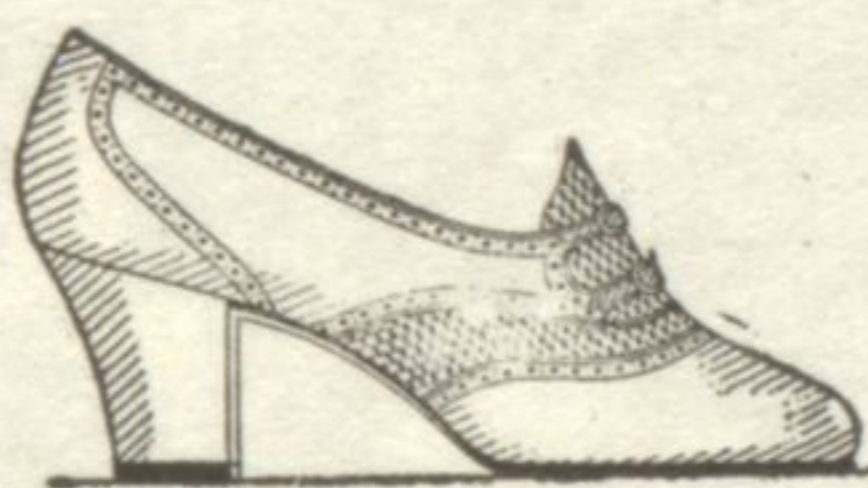
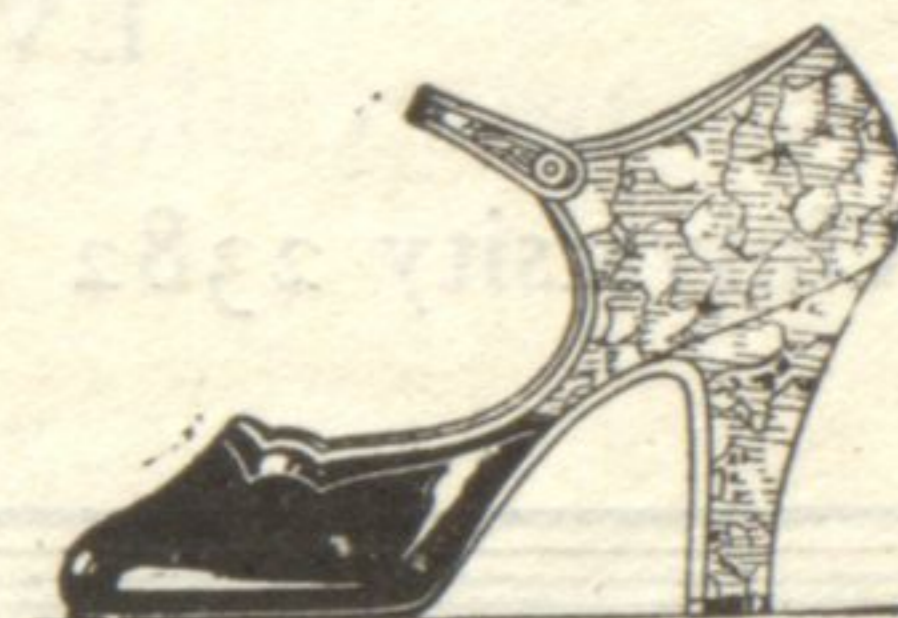
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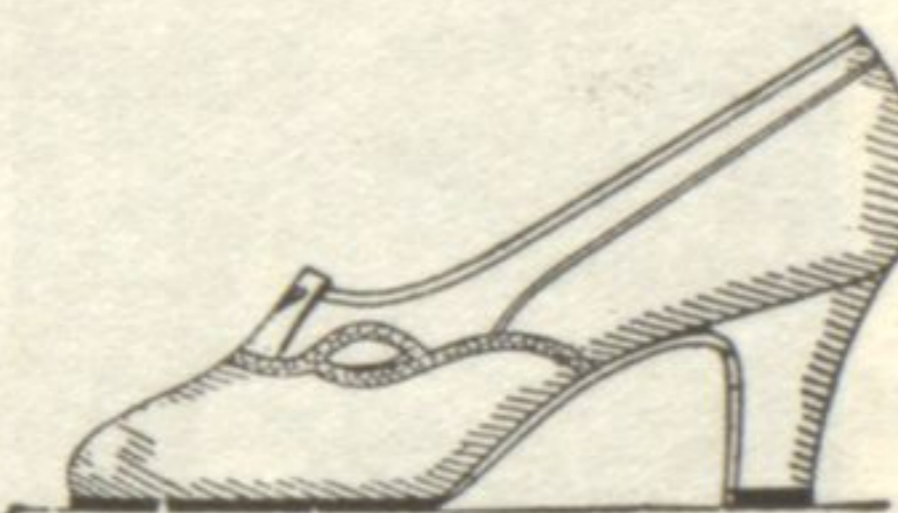
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
