About a year ago Chrysler representatives sent out letters to a large number of California police who had bought Chrysler cars for use in their traffic duties and asked how their cars were performing. Olds did not reply at the time, but the other day he dropped in to see a Chrysler distributor to give his answer to the query.

"You tell 'em for me," he said, "that there never was another automobile like it. You can say I chased speeders for the better part of two years in that car and never lost one of them."

"I've had that car clocked at 78 miles an hour, and I've blown a front tire on a fifteen foot road traveling 65 miles an hour without even leaving the pavement."
