Funeral Services Held for Pioneer Winnetka Resident

Mrs. Johanne Marie Thorsen, widow of the late Ole C. Thorsen and pioneer resident of Winnetka, died at her home, 903 Willow street, Saturday evening at 10:15 o'clock. Funeral services were Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, from the residence, conducted by Rev. A. E. Rohrbach. Kenneth Morrow, of Chicago, was the soloist. Burial was at Memorial Park cemetery.

Mrs. Thorsen's maiden name was Johanne Marie Becken. She was born in Larvig, Norway, June 28, 1851 and came with her parents to Chicago in 1872. On January 11, 1879 she was united in marriage with Ole C. Thorsen, who preceded her in death, July 29, 1916. Mrs. Thorsen's family came to the north shore in 1882. She was the last surviving member.

Six children are left to mourn her passing, four sons and two daughters. The sons are Dr. Arthur V. Thorsen, of 1636 Columbia avenue, Chicago, with offices in the Rapp building, Winnetka; Martin S. To Hold Hearing on Abandonment of Road Project

The Streets, Drainage and Forestry Committee of the Village Council plans to hold an informal public hearing on Tuesday evening, April 26, at 8:00 o'clock at the Village hall for the purpose of considering the suggestion that special assessment proceedings now in court for the extension of Sunset Road for one block between Center street, the new through highway, and Church Road, be abandoned.

This improvement, which was adopted by the Board of Local Improvements about two years ago, after public hearings, is for the purpose of providing access from the west to the new through highway and by means of a subway to be constructed later at the time of grade separation, for access to the southeast portion of the Village.

The committee desires to have the benefit of suggestion of property owners interested in this improvement, both from those favoring it and those in opposition, in order that a decision for the best interests of that part of the Village may be reached.

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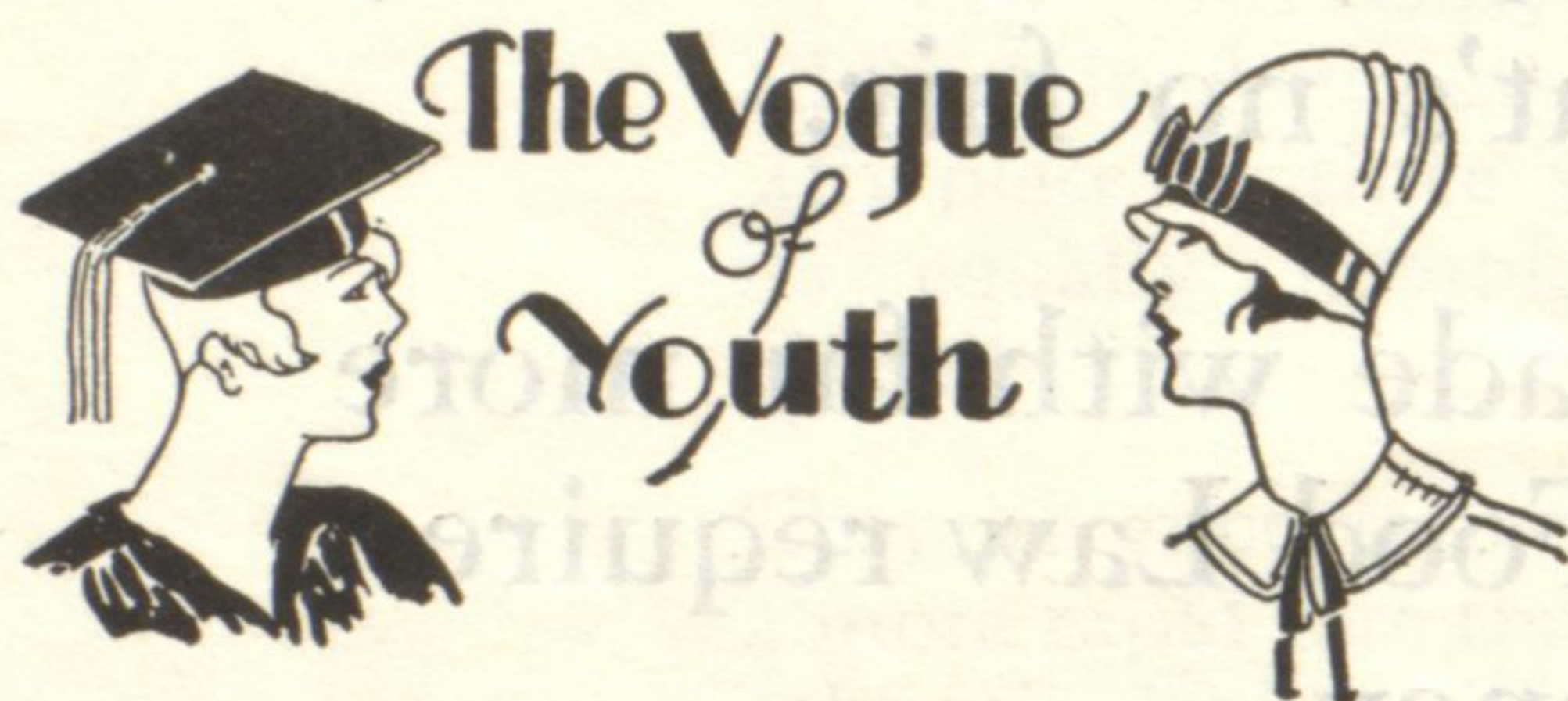
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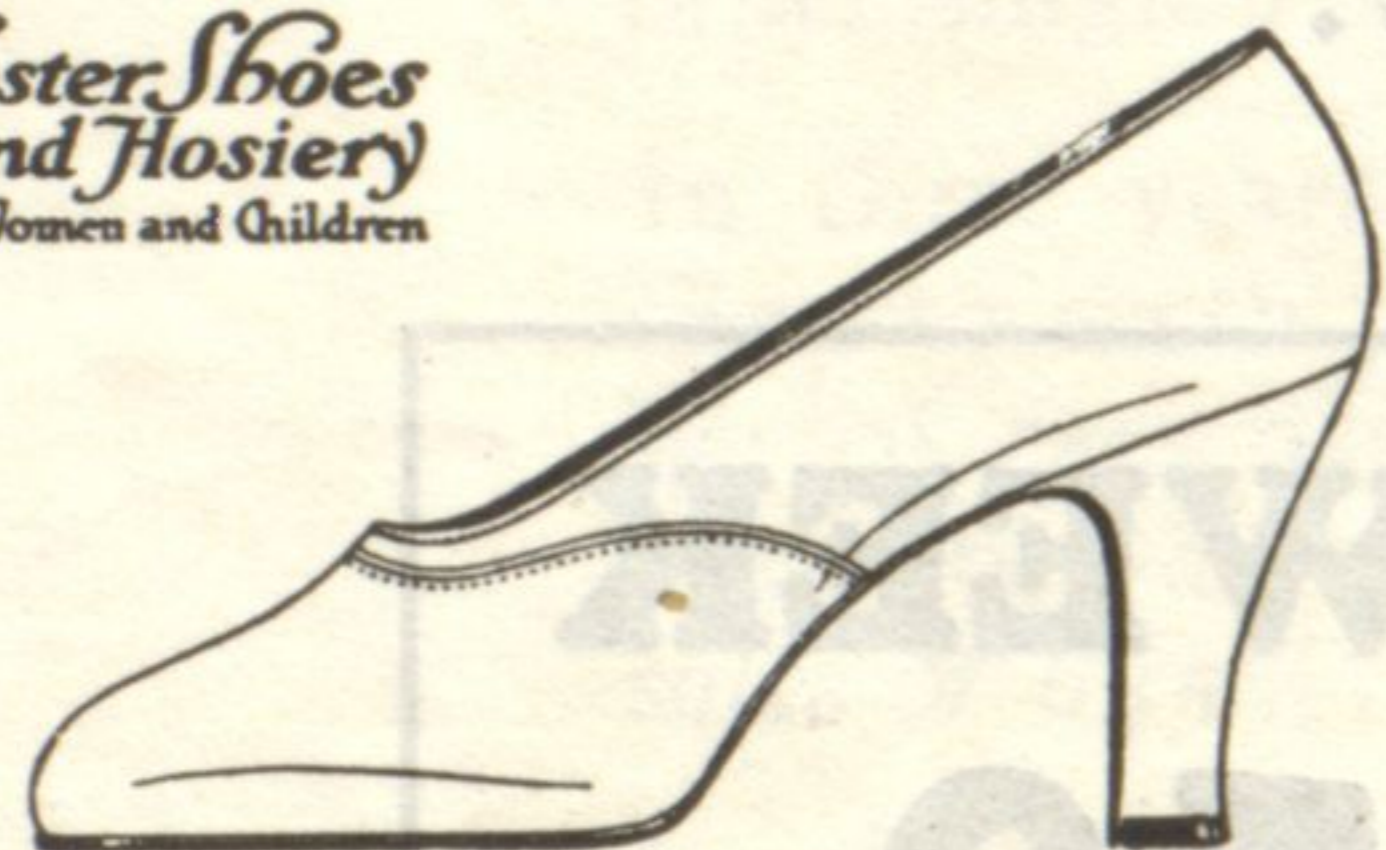
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
