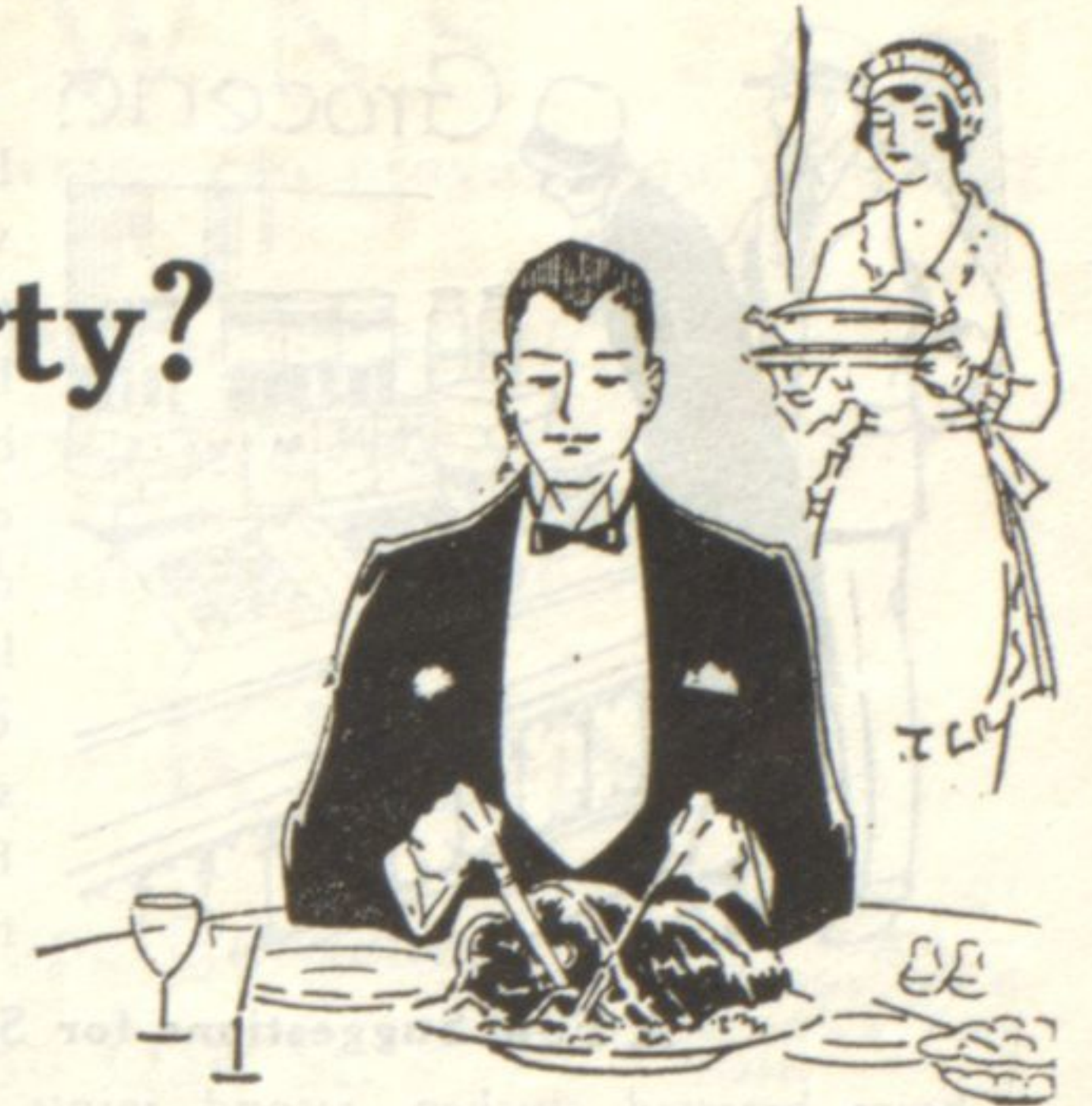
Clarence Edinger of Evanston was best man and Roy Olsen, Howard Mattias, and William Melvin were ushers. All of the groomsmen live in Evanston.
