### Buildings Erected During Year Valued at \$1,652,515

Permits for the erection of buildings valued at \$1,652,515 were issued by the Village of Wilmette during the fiscal year from April 1, 1926, to March 31, 1927, according to a report made by Superintendent of Public Works C. C. Schultz at the meeting of the Village Board on May 17.

Of the total amount, \$1,426,800 represented permits for the erection of 118 new residences; \$78,265 permits for 157 new garages; \$82,950 the cost of 38 alterations or additions to property already built and \$64,500 miscellaneous building projects and school buildings.
