North Shore Grads Given Degrees at N. K. E. C. Closing

The commencement exercises of the National Kindergarten and Elementary college, held in Harrison hall Wednesday afternoon, June 8, were unusually lovely and impressive. The daisy chain, carried by sixty white-clad freshmen, formed the aisles through which the graduating students passed, and was then festooned in long loops across the front of the stage and carried on up into the balcony.

President Edna Dean Baker's welcome to the parents and friends of the graduating students was followed by the commencement address given by Dr. Albert W. Palmer of Oak Park. Dr. Palmer chose as his subject the words "Like a Tree," and suggested several tree characteristics which the teacher might wisely emulate—the spirit of aspiration and growth; the sending out of sturdy roots of faith and courage and loyalty which will bring nourishment and strength from hidden sources; fruitfulness; the courageous acceptance of environment and the unceasing effort to transform that environment into a thing of beauty.

Diplomas and degrees were presented 188 students who had completed the required courses. The degree of

Bachelor of Education was conferred on Miss Mary Virginia Raffety of Wilmette, and the Kindergarten-Primary diploma presented to the following north shore students:

Announcement was also made at this time by Merritt Starr of Winnetka, president of the board of trustees, of gifts which have been received by the college during the year; one of the most deeply appreciated being that of \$5,000 from R. D. Long of Oak Park for the endowment of a scholarship in the name of his sister, Eva Grace Long, a beloved alumnae of the college in whose memory the alumnae room is dedicated. Other gifts totaling \$20,653 have been received for the building and equipment funds, and \$947 for the Mary Crane Nursery school, Hull house, which is conducted by the college.

Christian Science Churches

"God the Preserver of Man" was the lesson-sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, Sunday, June 12.

The true sense of being and its eternal perfection should appear now, even as it will hereafter" (p. 550).
