Flight of Lindbergh to Be Shown in Fire at 4th Celebration

A fireworks picture of Lindbergh's flight from America to Paris, stretching all the way across the gridiron at Dyche stadium, will be the climax of the spectacular Fourth of July celebration Evanston is planning this year. This specialty is only one of the 60 or 70 which the greatest fireworks display the north shore has ever seen will include in the one hour program at the close of the evening. Noah's ark with the animals making their exit, Eiffel tower and other interesting objects will help fill up the program offered by the bright lights.

The program at the stadium will begin at 7:30 and cover about three hours' time. A professional act featuring ten clowns, will hold the stage for about a half hour during the earlier part of the evening. Several short and snappy demonstrations by local organizations such as the Boy Scouts, who will drill, and the Bureau of Recreation, will usher in the celebration.

Under the direction of the Bureau of Recreation, the Pirate Drill, in which more than a hundred boys participated at the spring festival, will be repeated at this Independence day observance. The girls who did the Tarantella dance, about 125 in number, at the festival, will present this number as part of the Recreation bureau's contribution.

To focus the attention of the audience on the significance of the day itself, the salute to the flag will be given by the assembled spectators, followed by the voices of nearly 50,000 united in a rendition of America.

A daylight fireworks display will lead up to the big feature of the evening, the night fireworks described above. Besides the specialties, there will be about 350 shells in the air during the exhibit.

The committee is busy trying to solve the problem of how to seat the crowd of 40,000 expected to attend in the stadium which has only 34,000 seats available. The tickets are reserved and an early purchase is advisable. After July 2, the price on individual admission tickets will be raised from 50c to 75c.
