Village Manager's Annual Report

Editor's note: Following is the final installment of Village Manager H. L. Woolhiser's annual report made to the Village council recently. The report is a comprehensive survey of every phase of municipal administration of the village during the past fiscal year and should be of vital interest to every taxpayer and voter in Winnetka. It affords an insight into the great responsibility which lies with out municipal servants, a responsibility far greater than the casual observer can ever comprehend.

RECOMMENDATIONS

It is believed that the needs of the Council will be served by recording here some recommendations for the work of the coming year:

1. Consideration should be given to the completion of the through traffic highway by the construction of the section from Elm street to Tower road, by widening and repaving Center street and also the section in the Manns Indian Hill subdivision, south of Winnetka avenue.

2. Consideration should be given to the necessity of extending the storm water sewer system in certain sections of the Village where work was started prior to the war, and the Sanitary District authorities should be urged to increase the capacity of their north shore intercepting sewer, which is now badly overloaded, after heavy rainfalls and thaws.

3. The question of the annexation of areas west of Winnetka, not now a part of any municipality, should be referred to the Plan Commission for consideration and recommendation.

Inasmuch as newly annexed areas derive substantial benefits from public improvements previously made in older sections, such as water main feeder lines, pavement of arterial highways, public buildings, etc., it is recommended that

consideration be given to a plan adopted in other cities whereby annexed subdivisions be required to reimburse the municipality on annexation, based on the benefits derived from public improvements previously made.

4. It is suggested that the Council take up with the owners of the building on Center street immediately north of the new Village hall, the question of remodeling their building to harmonize with the architecture of the Village hall and the entire block, in accordance with the recommendations of the Plan Commission.

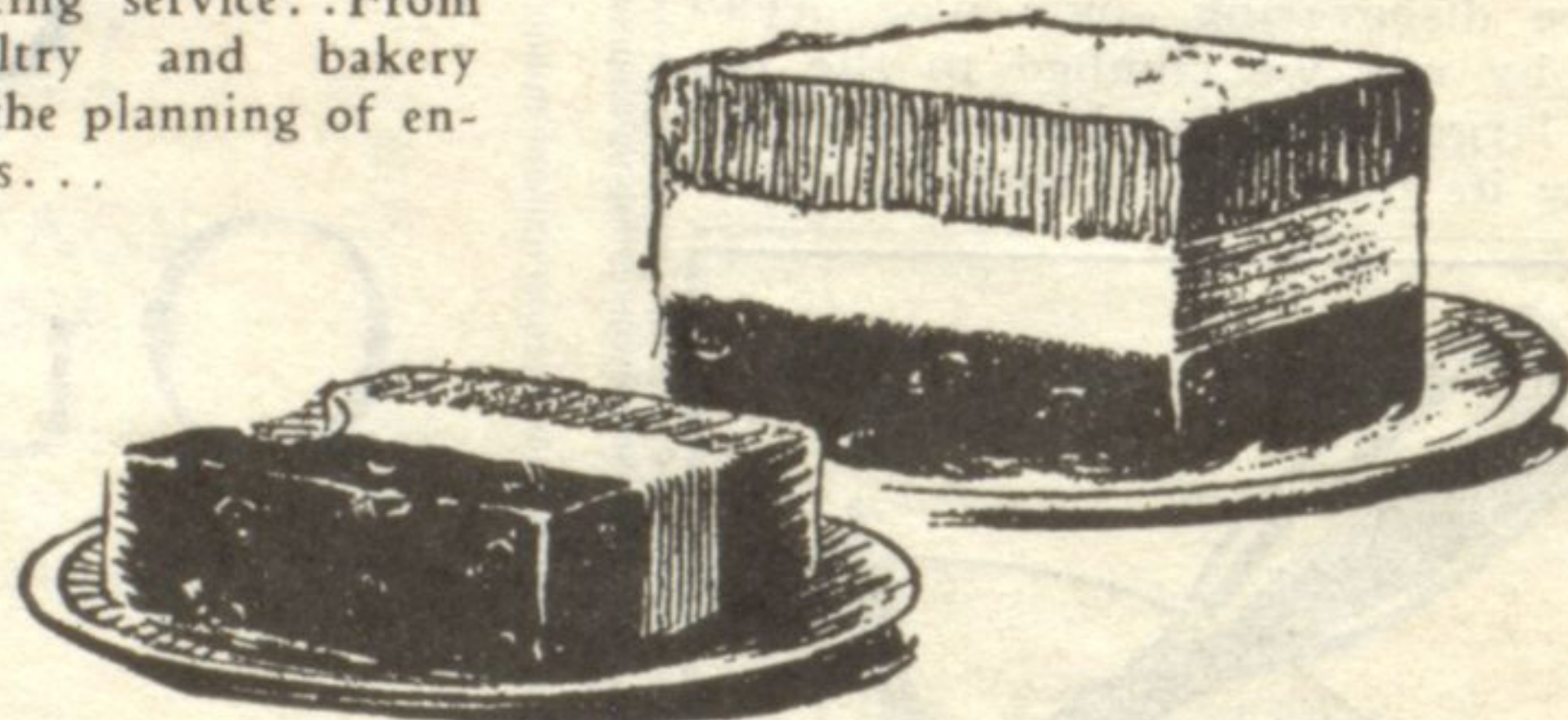
5. Inasmuch as the Village of Winnetka is legally obligated by state statutes to establish police and fire department pension funds, and particularly inasmuch as in each of these departments there is now a dependent employee entitled to pension remuneration under the statute, steps should be taken to establish legally constituted pension boards during the coming year.

6. It is recommended that the Village Engineer be authorized to make a comprehensive study of encroachments on public streets in the Village, as there are numerous cases where fences and shrubbery have been placed outside of private property lines, with an indication of ownership. Some provision should be made for requiring fences to be removed and in cases where shrubbery is allowed to remain, for the placing of permanent markers at the expense of property owners.

7. The present Municipal Code is entirely antiquated and has been amended to such an extent that it is difficult to administer the existing ordinances with any degree of convenience, both to the organization and the
