### Chief's Story

But all of this, however important it may be in developing character, true sportsmanship, fellowship, and a healthy body, by no means sums up the activities, nor does it fully set forth the true purpose of Indian Hill camp. There is something more important than this; something without which no camper leaves the shores of Lake Hamlin, something which many former campers, now grown to men, look back upon as one of the extremely significant periods of their boyhood. It may be summed up in one word, campfire. Nobody but one who had this rich experience can ever appreciate its full meaning. It is shortly after 8 o'clock in the evening when the campers gather around the fire on the shores of the lake and lie on the ground or sit on the old log benches now worn by two decades of campers that have gone

before. The scene, as the sun goes down and darkness gathers, and the night wind rustles in the trees and ripples on the lake, is far beyond description. After some ten minutes of singing their favorite songs, the gathering witnesses an imaginary curtain drawn aside, and the scene presents the entertainment a certain tent group has arranged for that evening. Each tent has one or two nights on which to entertain. It runs from the ridiculous to the sublime. There are cracker and onion-eating contests, potato races, speeches, debates, recitations of poetry, and rare instrumental and vocal musical entertainment. This is all participated in by the campers with the exception of one night when the councilors entertain. Now comes Chief's story, and with a closing prayer, is a fitting ending for the day. Not a noise is heard but the sound of the woods and Chief's voice. As the story proceeds, a glance around the campfire will reveal faces lit with eagerness and wonderment. Each night the campers thus assemble, each time for something slightly different.

### True Meaning of Camp

But it is not until the final night at campfire that the story of Indian Hill camp is really told. Here is sealed the last bond which each year makes the group a unity. It may not seem as significant as it is as I put it down in writing, but to many of the campers gathered there that last night it is the turning point of their lives. For it is here that Chief probes the very heart of the camper in establishing his estimate of the individual. It is this one episode, this gathering together of the experiences of camp life and weaving them into a design, which might rightly be called the symbol of Indian Hill camp.
