## McKenney Captures Flag Tournament at Skokie Playfield

The winning number for the blind bogey held Saturday and Sunday at Skokie Playfield course was 81, with 83 taking second place and 85 third. In the flag tournament held Monday morning, July 4, the winners were S. F. McKenney, first; P. R. Kreger, second; L. M. Stoddard, third; D. S.

Chase, fourth; and W. Wolter, fifth. The winners of the contest for the least number of putts on eighteen holes were Howard Carpenter with 25 putts and Fred Stoddard with 28 putts.

The men's driving contest on Monday afternoon was won by F. Wolter, with an average of 228 yards; Roy Nelson, with an average of 215 yards; and Stanley Scully, with an average of 212 yards.

Winners of the men's approaching and putting contest were G. Lindwall, first; Elmer Nelson, second; and Jack Young, third.

The women's driving contest was won by Mrs. C. Waterton, with an average of 143 yards; Helen Tilroe, with an average of 134 yards, and Mrs. C. B. Cook, with an average of 100 yards. The winners of the women's approaching and putting contest were Mrs. Smith, first; Mrs. Waterton, second, and Carol Fossum, third.

The events for this week-end are scheduled to be a second round cup tournament on Saturday and Sunday and a one-club tournament on Sunday afternoon, for which players will select one favorite club and play every stroke on all eighteen holes with it. Westland registered a 68 and, in addition, by scoring a 74, won first prize in the 36-hole low gross event.

### Veteran Takes Honors

George H. Leslie of Indian Hill showed that twenty-five years of golf hasn't dulled his game in the least by shooting 75-18-57. This card, the gross three strokes above par, included three birdies and won for Leslie an award for best low net. A quarter of a century ago Leslie was a semi-finalist in the national amateur championship.
