Committee Making Progress on C. of C. Winnetka Book

Progress was reported to the Chamber of Commerce at its meeting Monday evening relative to the matter of printing a booklet on Winnetka, as suggested at a meeting of the Chamber on the evening of June 13. The matter at that time was referred to the Public Affairs committee.

Vic Killian, chairman, recommended an issue of 3,000 copies, containing a street map of the village, important historical sketches and pictures, the publication designed as a high grade piece of work. 

WOULD MAKE SKOKIE BIG WORLD AIRPORT

Glencoe Man Offers Solution for Reclamation of Expansive North Shore Valley

The prediction by Herbert Hoover, Secretary of commerce, that Chicago is destined to be the aviation center of the United States, and a suggestion from Hal Burnett, of 724 Vernon avenue, Glencoe, that the United States government convert the great Skokie Valley into the largest and most advantageously located airport in the world, is meeting with approval by many north shore citizens who have been concerned for several years with the solution of the Skokie development problem.

Here, in the Skokie Valley, it is pointed out, is a vast area eight or ten miles in length and a mile or more in width, in which modern vehicles of the air may find an ideal spot for departure and landing.

Mosquito Breeder

At present, the Skokie Valley is covered with swamp grass, and is notorious for its mosquito hordes, while the matter of its reclamation has been discussed at more conferences than any other one subject perhaps, except it be the League of Nations.

And still no solution has been reached, unless the one which Mr. Burnett now brings forth should prove to be feasible and popular. The latest move to reclaim the Skokie was taken a short time ago, just a few days before the adjournment of the state legislature, when it was attempted to have the state take some action to bring about a comprehensive draining and development plan of the valley.

Ideal Airport? As an airport, the location of the Skokie is pointed out as ideal. Lying as it does at the very threshold of Chicago, on the north shore between two excellent lines of transportation, the Chicago & North Western, and the Chicago, North Shore and Milwaukee railways on the east and the Skokie Valley line of the latter road on the west, it is readily accessible to the great metropolitan center.

For mail planes both arriving and departing on trans-continental trips the location is said to be ideal, and particularly so, for passenger planes.
