## TEACH CHILD TO LIKE READING SAYS EXPERT

Dr. Gray of University of Chicago Gives Valuable Hints to Kindergartners

Dr. William Scott Gray, dean of the School of Education, University of Chicago, lectured before the student body of the summer session of the National Kindergarten and Elementary college. Friday afternoon, July 8. His topic was "Reading Preparation and Training." Dr. Gray stated that the matter in which he was most vitally interested was the teaching of children to read so they will become good, thoughtful, interested readers and outlined a system of procedure from the nursery school and kindergarten age to the time of learning to read which in his opinion would produce just such a type of reader. He gave six avenues through which the desired result could be accomplished:

1. Wide experience and the arousal of keen interest in learning to read.

2. Reasonable facility in the use of ideas. 3. Facility in the use of simple Eng-

lish sentences. 4. Increasing the oral vocabulary.

5. Correct habits of pronunciation and enunciation. 6. A strong desire to read should be
