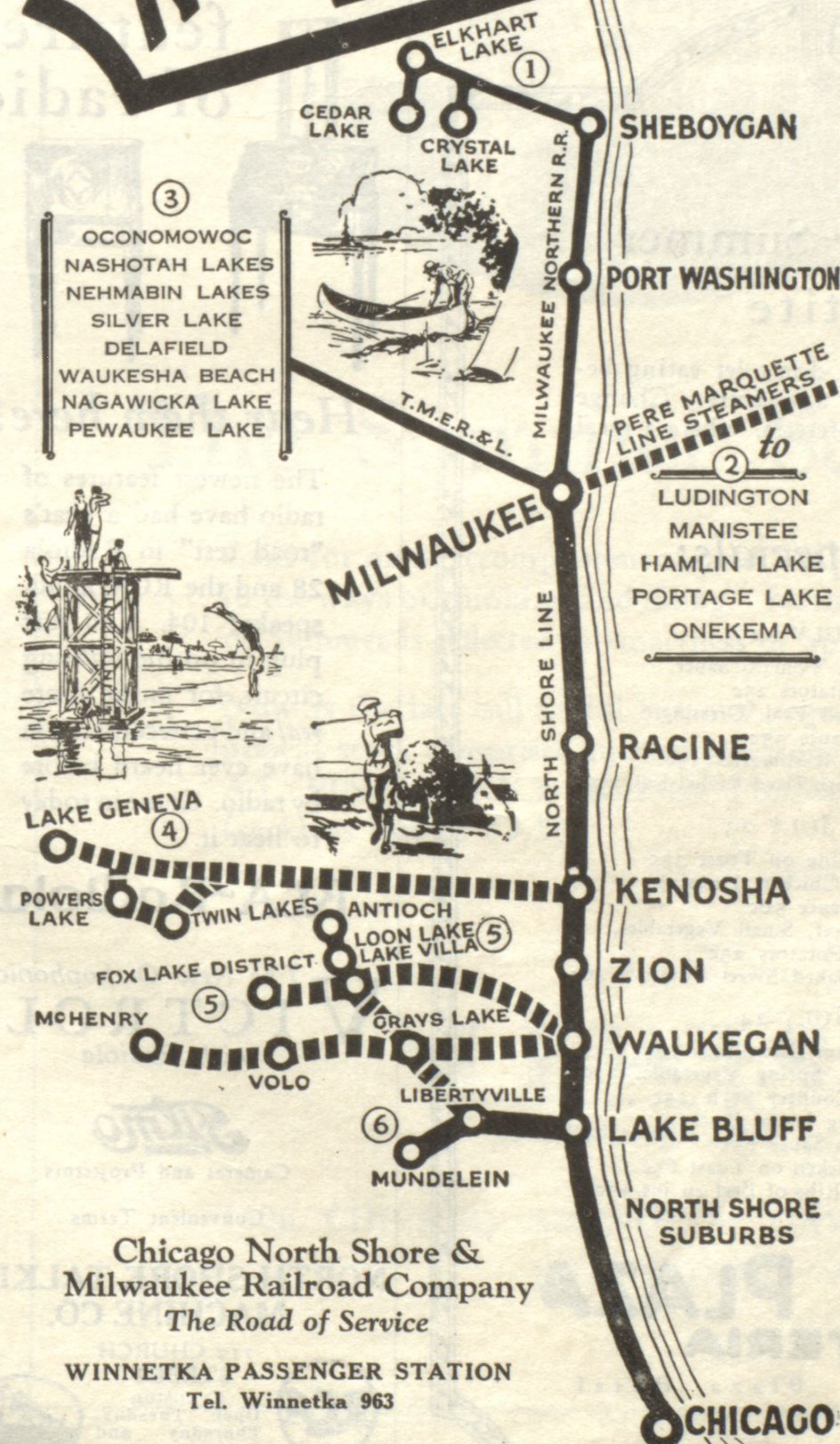

1. Elkhart Lake, Cedar Lake, Crystal Lake, Sheboygan, Port Washington: Take North Shore Line to Milwaukee; connections at door of our Milwaukee terminal with Milwaukee Northern train for these points.

4. Lake Geneva, Twin Lakes, Powers Lake: Take North Shore Line trains to Kenosha; comfortable North Shore Line Motor Coaches operate from there, on regular schedule, to these points. Through tickets.

5. Antioch, Channel Lake, Loon Lake, Round Lake, Lake Villa, Grays Lake, Volo, Fox Lake Resorts, McHenry: Take North Shore Line trains to Waukegan or Libertyville; North Shore Line Motor Coaches from there on regular schedule to these points. Through tickets.

6. Libertyville, Mundelein: (Don't let the summer pass without a visit to beautiful St. Mary of the Lake at Mundelein.) Best reached by North Shore line trains.
