

Children Win Hearty Applause and Favor in Winnetka Day Parade

As a deviation from the parade program of former years in Winnetka day celebrations, the children's section which, heretofore has been made a part of the general parade, was made a feature all by itself, last Thursday.

The wisdom of the change was demonstrated by a very greatly increased number of participants in the children's parade over that of former celebrations, and also in much more elaborate preparations in the way of decorated bicycles and small vehicle floats. It was one of the prettiest features of the day.

The children's parade was held at one o'clock, marching from the village hall to the park, and headed by the prize winning floats in the morning parade.

The first prize was awarded to Lemuel Stearns, of 1087 Oak street, who drove the gayly decorated airplane, "Spirit of St. Louis," a miniature vehicle of the air cleverly mounted on a bike.

Thirteen prizes were awarded in the children's parade, but unfortunately the judges did not record the entries by name, but by number, instead, and

The second prize went to the Hubbard Woods cafe, and the third, "Winnetka Beautiful," to Bruce Karnes, 151 Fuller lane, who, accompanied by Dorothy Jane Karnes, piloted his prettily decorated miniature electric auto and trailer amid the hearty applaud of the throng which lined Elm street from the village hall to the park.
