Among the citations which com-

 ment in him struggled with the divine,
 our great Teacher said: "Not my will,
 but Thine, be done!"—that is, Let not
 the flesh, but the Spirit, be represented
 in me. This is the new understanding
 of spiritual Love. It blesses its en-
 emies, heals the sick, casts out error,
 raises the dead from trespasses and
 sins, and preaches the gospel to the
 poor, the meek in heart" (p. 33).
