

Northwestern Benefits by Will of Late Judge Gary

Northwestern university is one of the eight colleges to share the eight trust funds of \$50,000 each provided for in the will of the late Judge Elbert H. Gary, a trustee of Northwestern.

Elizabeth Campbell Clark of Evanston, granddaughter of Mr. Gary, receives a trust fund of \$300,000, while Mrs. Robert Campbell, Mr. Gary's daughter, receives one of the trust funds of \$800,000 each established for his two daughters, Mrs. Campbell and

Mrs. Gertrude Gary Sutcliffe of Chicago. Upon the death of Mrs. Gary the daughters will share for life the income from the third of the residuary estate willed to her together with the Gary estate, Ivy Hall, near Jericho, L. I., and the town house in New York city, where Judge Gary died August 15.

The First Methodist Episcopal church at Wheaton, Illinois, from which Judge Gary was buried, and where the Rev. Almer Pennewell, former Evanston pastor, is now preaching, was willed a trust fund of \$50,000.

When the will was recently probated in New York, the value of the estate was not disclosed, but it has been estimated as high as \$50,000,000.

Other colleges sharing the scholarship trust funds with Northwestern university are McKendree college, Lebanon, Ill.; University of Pittsburgh; Lafayette college, Easton, Pa.; Trinity college, Hartford; Lincoln Memorial university, Harrogate, Tenn.; Syracuse university, and New York university.

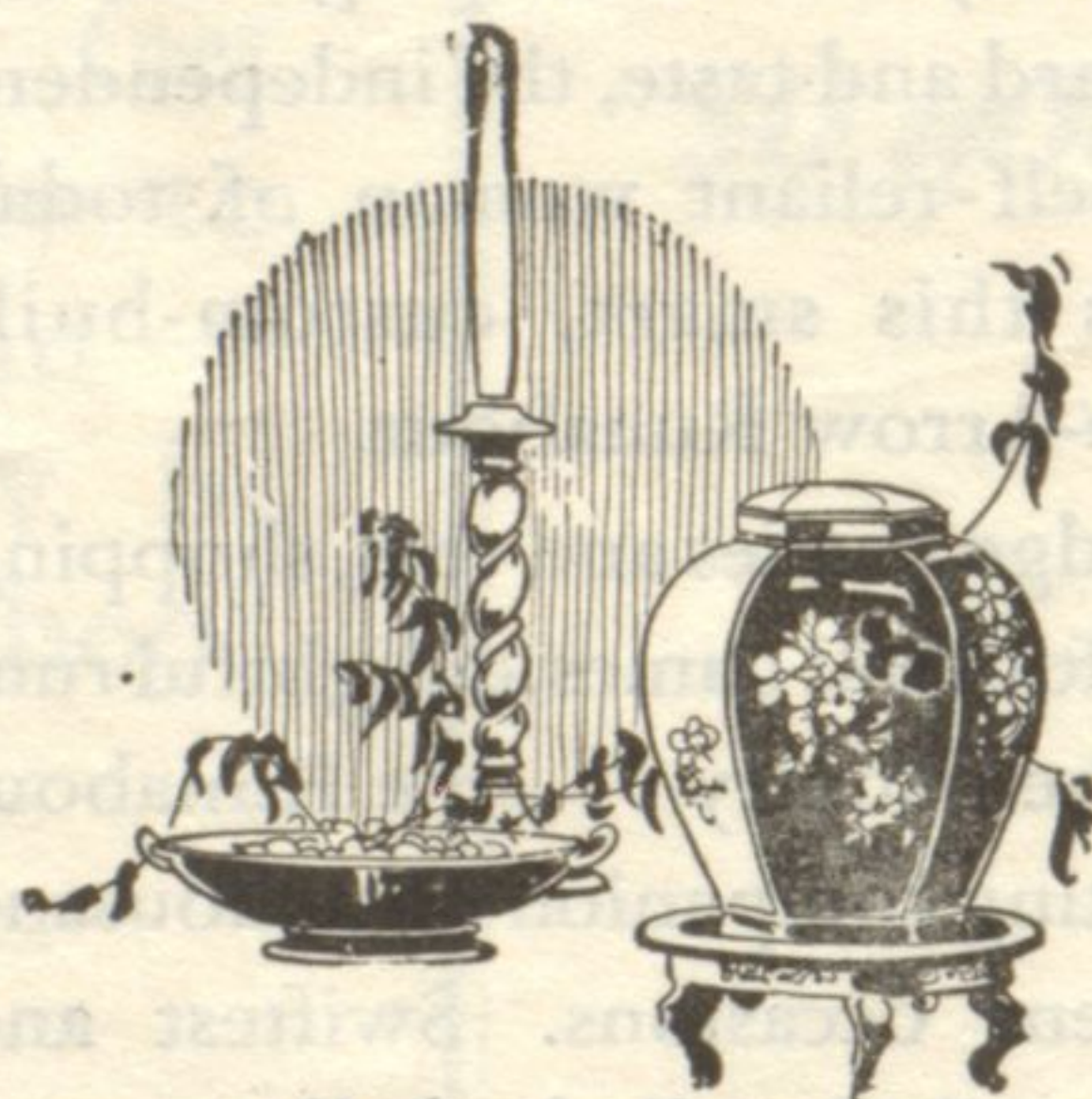
