

Kurtis Brownell Wins New Laurels in Musical Work

Kurtis Brownell, formerly of 852 Oak street, Winnetka, now of Santa Monica, Cal., spent last week visiting friends and relatives on the north shore and in Chicago.

Mr. Brownell was enroute to New York City, after a four months vacation with his parents and sister in Santa Monica, to which city they moved last spring. In New York, he will continue his study of music at the Juilliard Musical Foundation through the 1927-28 term which opened on October 3.

It will be remembered that a year ago last June, Mr. Brownell entered the contest held in Chicago by the Juilliard Musical Foundation. At that

time, he won, over a large number of contestants, the fellowship awarded to the most promising tenor from the Chicago district. This fellowship afforded him the enviable privilege of studying for one year at the Juilliard Musical Foundation, under the tutelage of some of the best teachers in the country. During the year, besides making an excellent record in his studying, Mr. Brownell appeared upon two concert programs sponsored by the Foundation, as well as broadcasting several times from New York radio stations.

At the conclusion of the term of study, rigid examinations were given all students last May, before a committee of judges composed of impartial and experienced critics and artists. Mr. Brownell passed these examinations very favorably, thus winning for himself a second fellowship, entitling him to a second year of advanced study and

work. His own talent, developed through intensive study and the unceasing encouragement of his parents, has carried Mr. Brownell this last big step toward the success so surely predicted for him by unquestionable authorities.

During his residence in Winnetka, Mr. Brownell was well known as a young singer of unusual ability. He appeared in various musical productions on the north shore, as well as acting as soloist in Christ Church choir, in Winnetka, for some years.
