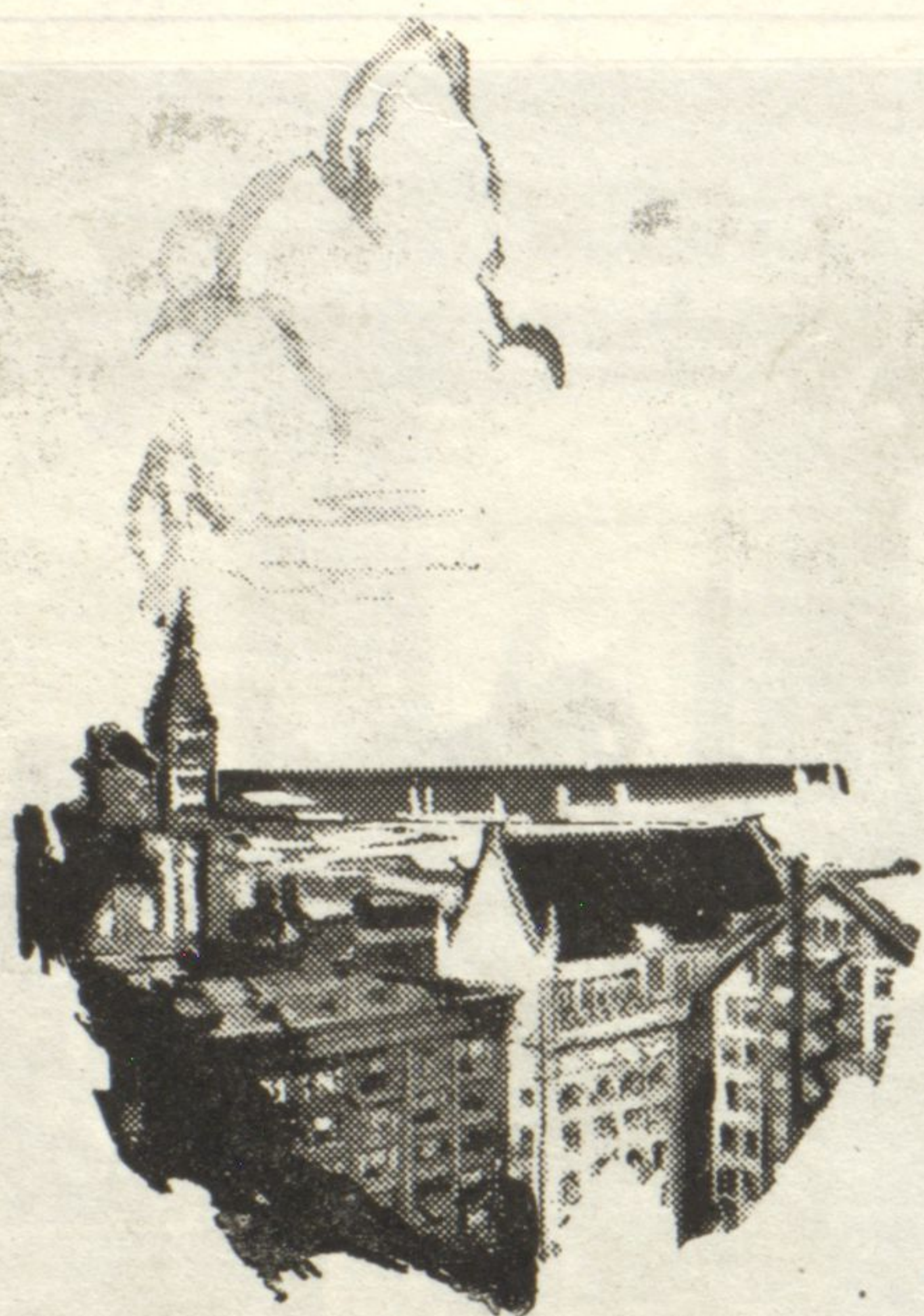

are made for monthly or seasonal occupancy. Garage service permits you to use your car if you desire. For meals, you have the choice of service in your apartment or in one of the five restaurants.

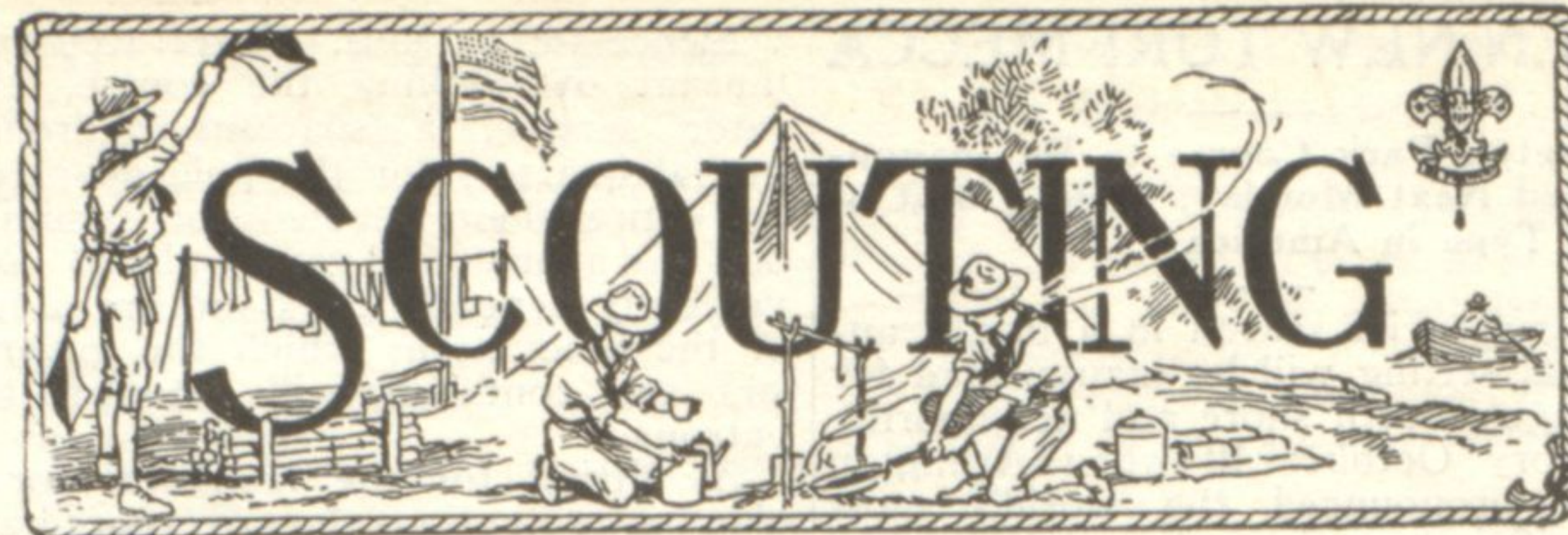
