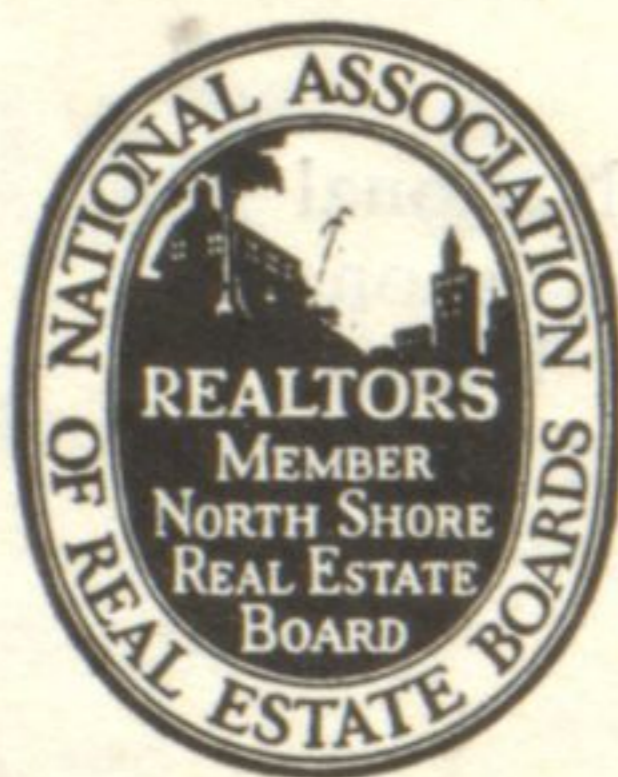
The first general session of the convention was held at the Broadview hotel Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.

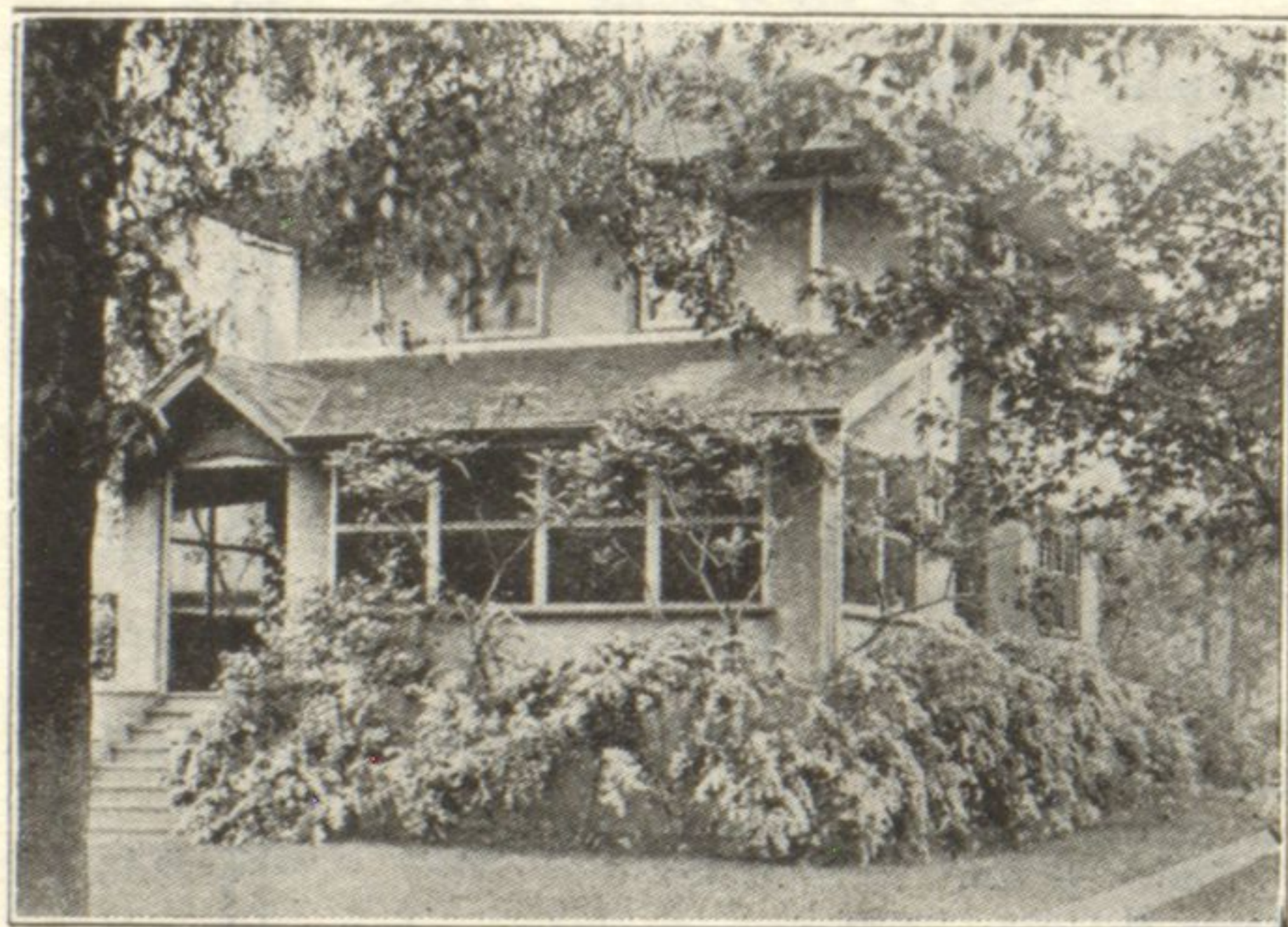
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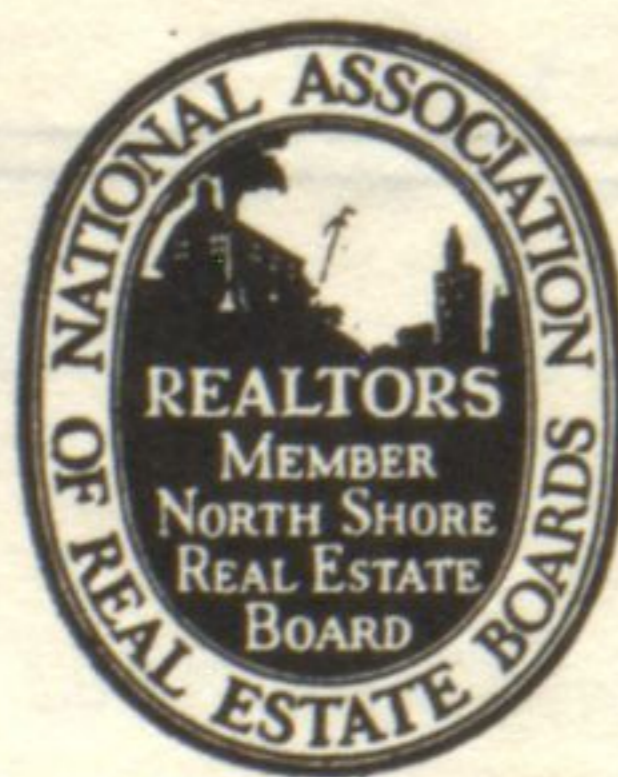


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
