Music Departments of Public Schools Make Fine Progress

Hinton G. Clabaugh, Chairman of the Pardon and Parole Board of Illinois, Sunday Club Speaker

Hinton G. Clabaugh of Winnetka, head of the Pardon and Parole board of the State of Illinois, will be the speaker at the Wilmette Sunday Evening club October 16. His subject will be, "Crime and Law Enforcement." Mr. Clabaugh was virtually drafted for the chairmanship of the parole board by Governor Len Small about two years ago, following charges of wholesale graft and unfair dealing lodged against parole board officials, which later resulted in a complete re-adjustment of that body.

Mr. Clabaugh gained a national reputation for efficiency and fair-dealing in his capacity as chief of the department of justice in the Chicago area during the world war.
