

### Council Acts to Prevent Trouble From Anchor Ice

For the purpose of safeguarding the Winnetka water supply from interference from anchor ice at the intake during the winter months, the Village council last Tuesday evening authorized the expenditure of \$3,600. This amount will be used by Village Manager H. L. Woolhiser to install an emergency connection on the intake. The work, it is said, will be done with-

in the next few weeks.

Last year a number of north shore communities experienced considerable trouble from anchor ice. Winnetka water service has never been interrupted from this cause, but it has been threatened, and the precautionary measure taken will avoid any possibility of trouble of this nature, it is explained.

## Individuality in Roof and Masonry

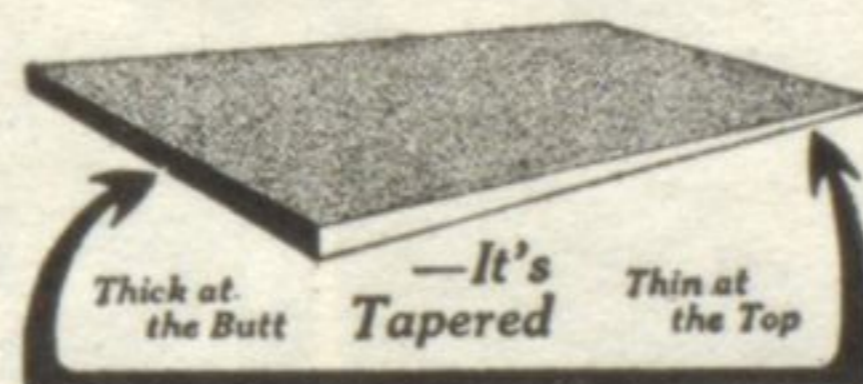
There is a personal note immediately evident in Mr. Emil A. Stake's home on Sunset Road in Chicago's beautiful North Shore suburb, Winnetka, Illinois.

The architect, Mr. Ralph W. Varney, of Chicago, achieved this individuality by a distinctive and unusual handling of usual building materials.

Dark red English Tudor face brick are laid up with skintled joints. Buff Bedford stone and split Wisconsin limestone are used in a manner suggestive of Normandy. However, the house, with its brick walls and hand-adzed half-timbered stucco, is unmistakably Tudor.

For the roof of this home, and for the garage as well, the Slatefield Blend of Winthrop Tapered Asphalt Shingles was selected. This is a blend of heather blue, heather green and purple and no little of the beauty of the house is due to the effect created by the purple in the Winthrops and the dark red of the bricks.

The whole is an excellent example of the use of colors that harmonize and that fit a structure into its surroundings.



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
