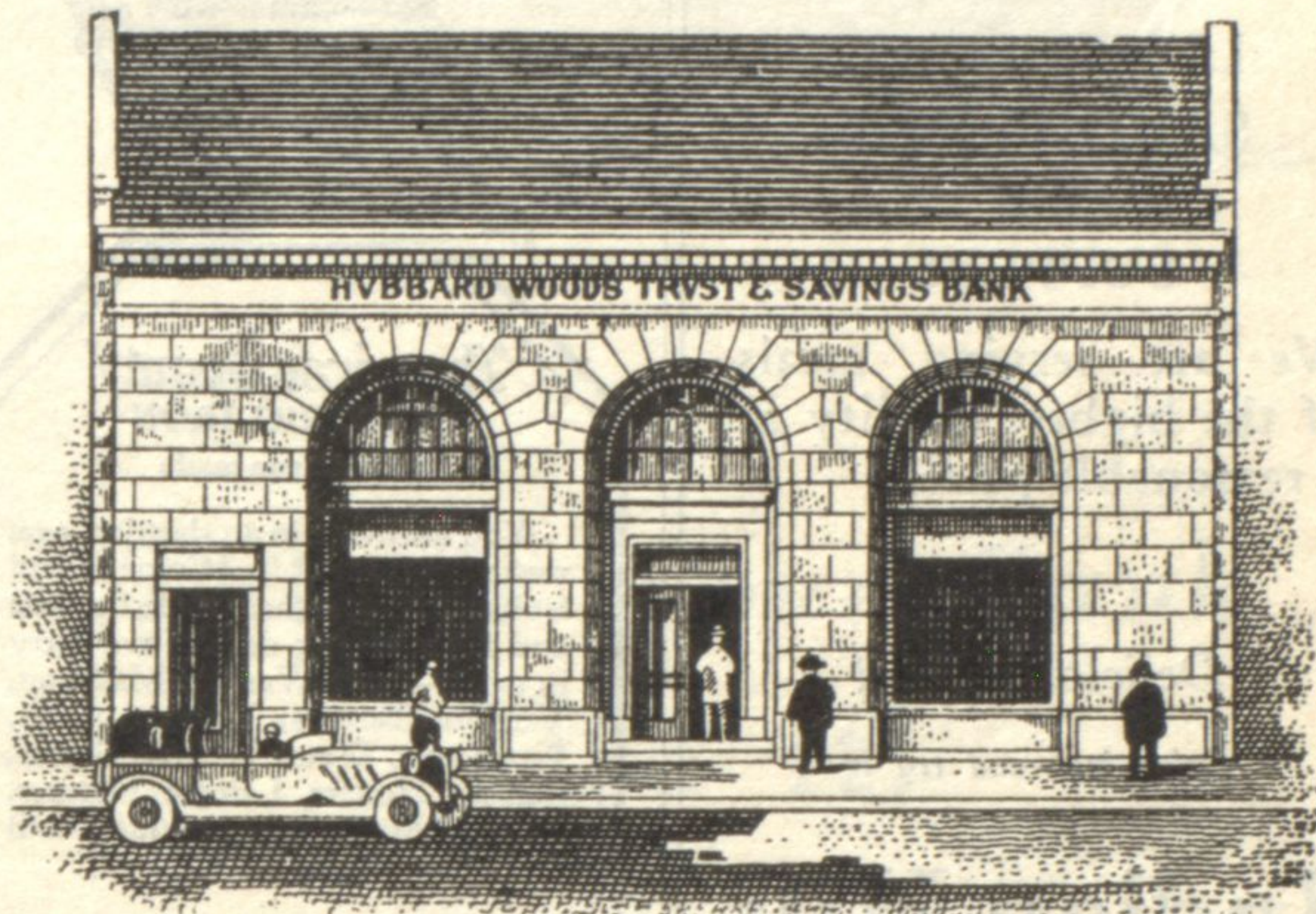
On the preceding Saturday, the North Shore's first team defeated a team from Evanston High school, 20 to 13. They played New Trier yesterday afternoon.

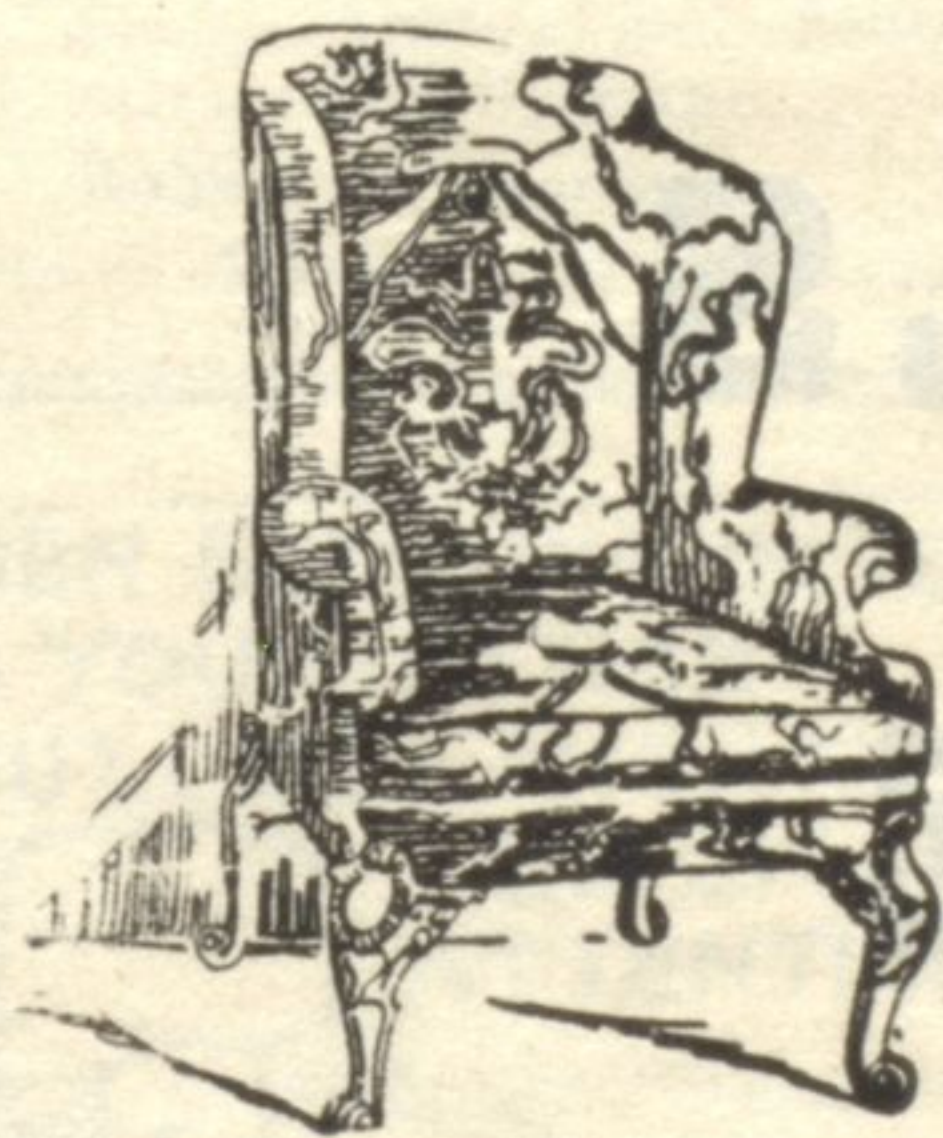
