### WINNETKA POLICEMAN DIES BY OWN BULLET

Patrolman Everett Meets Tragic Death When Revolver Discharges Accidentally

Patrolman Dudley C. Everett of the Winnetka Police department and hero of the World war, died Saturday of last week as the result of a wound sustained the night before by the accidental discharge of his revolver.

The accident occurred at his home, chairman, Dorothy Allen; refreshment | 786 Foxdale avenue, Winnetka. He was retiring and was in the act of placing the gun under his pillow, when, in some unaccountable manner, it was discharged.

The bullet, of 38 calibre, passed through Everett's body, entering one inch below the heart. He was removed to the St. Francis hospital, Evanston, where his death occurred the following day. A coroner's inquest was held at mette, Monday morning at 10 o'clock.

He was 41 years of age. Surviving, are his widow and three children. Rose Marie, Dudley C., and Anabelle. There are also three brothers and three sisters, all but one of whom. D. G.
