

Horatio G. Spafford was a Chicago lawyer living in what was then the suburban village of Lake View. He had a wife and four daughters. They had a beautiful home life. Then came a terrible bereavement. In 1873 Mrs. Spafford and her four daughters sailed on the "Ville De Havre" intending to spend the winter in Europe. In midocean the ship was struck by another vessel and in fifteen minutes it sank with all on board.
