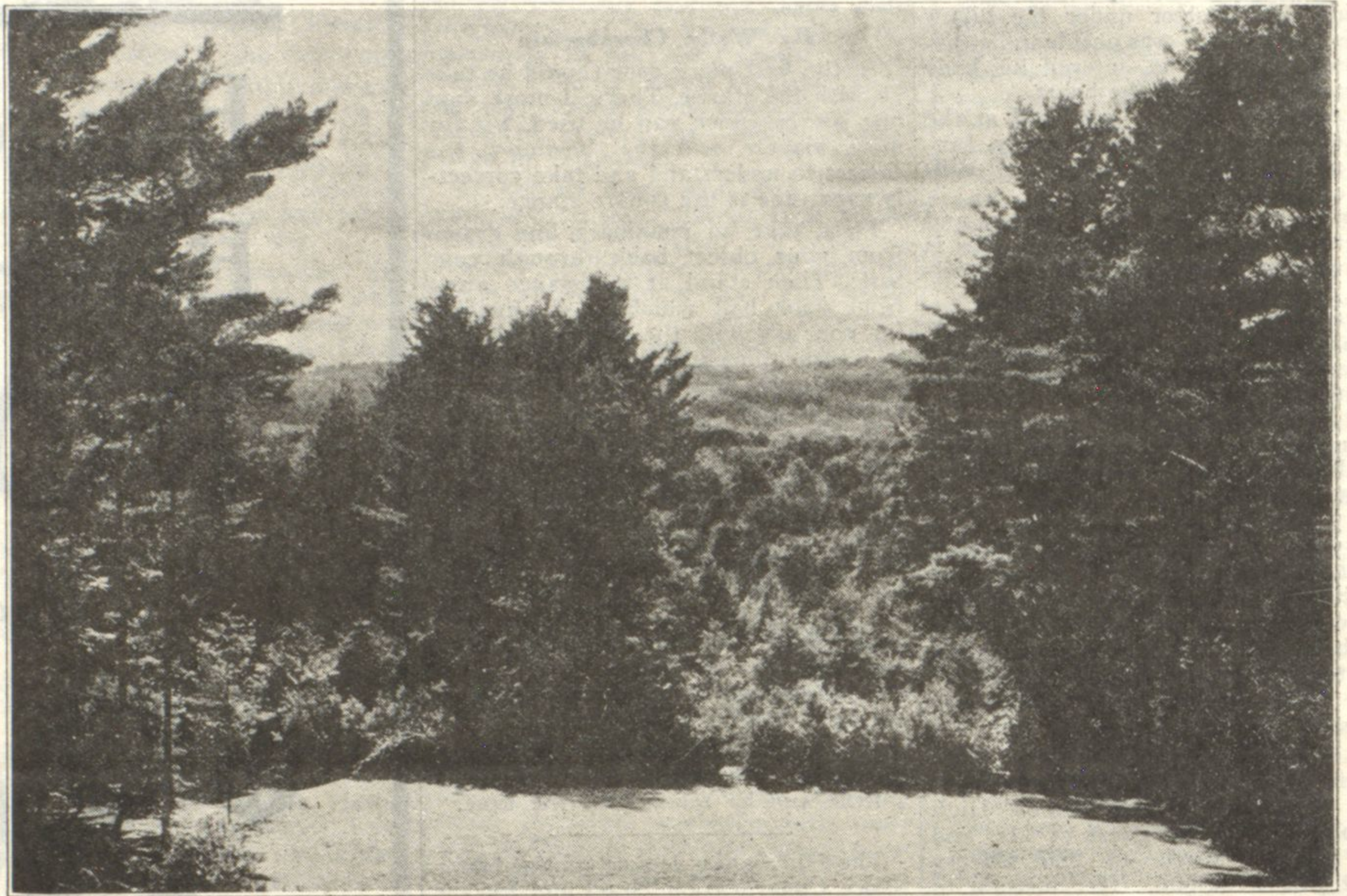
County Club Conference Thursday, November 10
