Chicago Manufacturer Buys Indian Hill Estates Home

North Shore Towns Show Big Gains in October Building

Building volume gains in numerous Chicago suburbs for October indicate that in the metropolitan area many suburbs are maintaining a pace that outrivals hundreds of cities throughout the country.

Despite an indicated 10 percent loss in building construction over the country generally, several important suburbs continued to make high gains in October. Wilmette eclipsed all the suburbs in October, 1927, gains over the same month last year by making a 201 percent gain, according to S. W. Straus and company.

This position is determined on the basis of the twenty-one important suburbs reporting. Another north shore suburb, Glencoe, made 159 percent gain in October, 1926.

Oak Park showed a 10 percent gain while its ancient rival, Evanston, could only display a loss. The low percentage of gain in Oak Park, however, and the loss in Evanston may be taken to indicate, according to the Straus report, that the hope in building activity for the next two months lies in the smaller and more distant suburbs than those immediately adjoining the city.

Other suburbs making gains and their percentages of October gains were as follows: DesPlaines 77 percent, Highland Park 51 percent, Joliet 59 percent and Winnetka 39 percent.

The story of the adventures and accomplishments of the Captain Marshall Field Brazilian Expedition of 1926 will be related in a free illustrated lecture to be given by George K. Cherrie, leader of the expedition, at Field Museum of Natural History Saturday afternoon, November 12. The lecture will be repeated Sunday. It will be given in the James Simpson theatre of the museum, and will begin at 3 o'clock on both afternoons. The public is invited.

This is the seventh of the Saturday, and the second of the Sunday afternoon free lectures being given this autumn at Field Museum.

Saturday, November 19, Prof. William H. Hobbs, leader of the University of Michigan Greenland Expedition, will lecture on "Explorations at the North Pole of the Winds." Next Sunday, November 20, the lecturer will be Dr. Wilfred H. Osgood, curator of zoology at the museum, who will tell the story of the Field Museum-Chicago Daily News Expedition to Abyssinia in 1926-1927, of which he was leader.
